Trains from Charlottetown for the west will leave every day as follows: 7.45 a.m. reaching Summerside at 9.50 a.m., connecting there with boat for Pt. du Chene, and proceeding to Tignish which place will be reached at 3.20 p.m. Another train will leave Charlottetown every afternoon at 3 o'clock, reaching Summerside at 5.55 p.m. and leaving there for Tignish at 7 p.m. arriving at Tignish at 10 p.m. A train will leave Cape Traverse at 6.25 a.m. daily connecting at Emerald Junction at 7.15 a.m.; and will leave Emerald Junction for Cape Traverse at 7.40 p.m. Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays a train leaves Emerald Junction at 7.20 a.m. for Summerside arriving at 8.30 and leaves on return for Cape Traverse at 2.15 p.m. Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays a train will leave Emerald at 7.20 a.m. for Charlottetown arriving here at 9.30 a.m. and leaving on return to Emerald at 4.35 p.m. Trains from the West for Charlottetown will leave Tignish at 5.45 a.m. and 12.15 p.m. leaving Summerside at 9 a.m. and 6.50 p.m. and arriving at Charlottetown at 11.40 a.m. and 9 p.m. Trains to and from the East are as follows: Leave Charlottetown for Souris and Georgetown daily at 6.45 a.m. and 3.30 p.m.; arriving at Souris at 10.50 a.m. and 6.20 p.m., and at Georgetown at 10.35 a.m. and 6.15 p.m. From Georgetown trains will leave at 5.20 a.m. and 1.20 p.m. and from Souris will leave at 5.38 a.m. and 1.10 p.m. arriving at Charlottetown at 8.15 a.m. and 5.20 p.m. The morning train from the east will connect at Royalty with the train west to catch the boat at Summerside for Pt. du Chene. On the Murray Harbor branch trains will leave Murray Harbor every week day except Saturday at 6.30 a.m. for Charlottetown and leave Charlottetown on return at 3.20 p.m. On Saturdays trains will leave Charlottetown for Murray Harbor at 7.35 a.m. and 3.20 p.m. and Murray Harbor at 6.30 a.m. and 2.15 p.m.
