IT PAYS to buy in this Province

**ESTATE ASSIGNED.**—The estate, credits and effects of William T. Clements, merchant and trader, of Glenwood, Prince County, have been assigned for the general benefit of his creditors. George Clements, farmer of the same township, has been appointed assignee. A meeting of the creditors will be held in Summerside on January 14th.

**TO INCREASE CAPITAL.**—The Prince Albert Black Fox Co., Ltd., is to be included among the fox corporations which are increasing their capital stock for next year's activities. The directors of this concern have notified their intention to apply to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council for supplementary letters patent to increase the capital of the company from its present amount, \$80,000, to \$100,000; the number of shares being correspondingly increased from 800 to 1,900, of the par value of \$100 each.

**CONCERT AT SOUTH GRANVILLE.**—The concert and Christmas tree held in South Granville School on Wednesday, December 16th, was very well attended and proved a great success. Mr. John G. MacKenzie presided; and in a few well-chosen remarks explained the purpose of the concert, after which the following program was rendered: Chorus by choir; opening speech, Dan MacDonaid; game of trades by eight boys; solo, Grace MacDonaid; recitation, John Duggan; solo, Phemie MacKenzie; recitation, Margaret Keir; reading, Mary Martin; violin selections, Geo. MacKenzie; recitation, Evelyn Corbett; solo, Gladys MacKenzie; dialogue, Greatest Plague in Life, by eight girls; intermission; sale of home-made candy, during which there was violin music with organ accompaniment; chorus; by choir; recitation, Dan Gunn; exercise, Merry Christmas, fourteen children; duet, Misses Bessie Falconer and Sadie MacKenzie; recitation, Mima Gunn; solo, Margaret MacKenzie; dialogue, A Matrimonial Advertisement, five characters; recitation, Mima Gunn; solo, Margaret choir. The Christmas tree which was well laden was unburdened and the various gifts distributed, and no one was forgotten. The proceeds go for enlarging and fencing the school grounds. Special mention should be made of the children who performed their parts very creditably, being their first attempt. The singing of the National Anthem brought this enjoyable evening to a close.

**NEW CANNING COMPANY.**—Another canning company is being formed in the Island. It is to be known as "The Eastern Canning Limited," with its chief place of business to be situated at Georgetown, King's County, and with a capital stock of \$100,000, divided into 1,000 shares of the value of \$100 each. Application is being made to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council for incorporation by letters patent. The first or Provisional directors are to be Messrs Douglas C. Morson, of Cardigan; Temple W. McDonald, of Georgetown; Dr. John D. McIntyre, of Montague; William D. Wright, of Pannure Island; Wallace W. Jenkins, of Georgetown; William S. Easton, of Georgetown; James C. Manuel, of Georgetown; John A. King, of Gasperaux; John W. McPhee, of Georgetown, all of whom with A. J. McDonald, of Georgetown, George McIntyre, of Montague, and Aaron O. Cogswell, of Georgetown, are the applicants for incorporation. The main objects of the company are to be as follows:—To purchase, erect, lease, transfer, acquire, operate, sell and exchange or otherwise dispose of establishments or places for curing, canning, or preserving fish, meats, fruits, vegetables and their products and all articles capable of being manufactured therefrom; to buy and sell, manufacture, can, preserve, and put up fish of all kinds, including shell fish, meats, fruit, vegetables and their products; to purchase, hold, own, acquire, construct, hire, operate, sell and dispose of vessels, steamboats, tugs, sail boats, motor-boats, boats, dories, engines, traps, nets, and equipment, and all machinery, appliances, instruments and things, necessary or proper for the carrying on and conducting of the business of the company; to purchase, lease, acquire, manage, operate, cultivate, plant, fish, develop, construct, mortgage, and sell or lease or otherwise hold or dispose of oyster areas, water lots, water areas, lands and real estate.
