To Stimulate Sale  
War Saving Stamps

MONTRIAL, Que., June 16 - To encourage further sales of war savings certificates through purchases of war saving stamps, eight new travelling outlets are being established this week and a thousand volunteer sales men will serve these centres according to an announcement by W. W. Swinden, general superintendent, sleeping and dining car department, Canadian National Railways.

These sales outlets, explained Mr. Swinden, are the 50 dining cars, the 20 cafe cars and the 10 buffet cars in daily service on trains on the Canadian National Railway's throughout the Dominion. The first dining cars to offer stamps for sale were those of the "International Limited," the "LaSalle," the "Continental Limited," the "Ocean Limited" and the "Scotian", and as supplies of stamps are distributed the dining services of other trains, will be ready for customers.

To stimulate sales the menu cards offered to passengers now carry a slip headed "our war effort" which further state "employees of the sleeping, dining and parlor car services are encouraging the sale of war saving certificates. The steward has war saving stamps for sale". There are a thousand employees assigned to these services and it is believed that an appreciable volume of sales will follow. No solicitation will be made beyond the suggestion contained in the printed slip.

To indicate progress of subscriptions made by these employees and the sales effected on the dining cars, each car will carry a "thermometer" with dollar marks for degrees and it is hoped that the record will be a torrid one.
