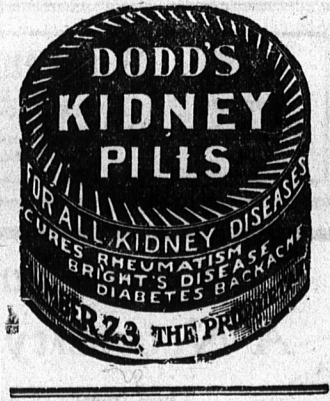

OLD-FASHIONED BUTTER SCOTCH

Ingredients: One and one-half tea-cupfuls of molasses, six ounces of brown sugar, four ounces of butter, one teaspoonful of vanilla, three dessertspoonfuls of vinegar, a very small pinch each of bicarbonate of soda and salt. Melt the butter, add the sugar, molasses, vinegar, soda and salt, and boil all together till a little dropped in cold water becomes brittle. Then add the vanilla and pour into a well-greased tin to harden. Mark into squares before it is quite cold.

A HARVESTER DIARY

Nov. 15 The snow that fell on Oct. 16 disappeared in a few days and the stocks dried so we began to thresh again Oct. 21 and continued threshing until we finished Nov. 13. An order-in-consul was passed permitting threshing to be done on Sundays. Some outfits worked but we rested on the Sabbath day. The weather was pretty cold the last four days we threshed—ten or fifteen below. We made fires of straw and even shovels to warm ourselves at. The engine was made to travel home after dark—four miles—the day we finished. It hauled the threshing machine, a water tank and two stook wagons. Two or three teams with wagons brought up the rear so we had quite a procession. A load of straw was driven beside the engine to furnish fuel. Ploughing was stopped by frost Nov. 9.

Nov. 25 The roads are as if they had been macadamized. On a calm morning the noise of wagons hauling wheat to market sounds like the traffic on city streets. When a load of wheat reaches the elevator it is driven up an incline on the scales. Two large square timbers hung at the centre form part of the scales platform. The four wheels of the wagon rest on these timbers. When the load is weighed the operator turns a crank and the rear ends of the timbers go down and the front ends go up. A hatch in the floor just behind the load is lifted and the lower half of the tailboard removed. Then the wheat all runs down into a big hopper. The lower half of the tailboard has hinges in its centre and a lever which when locked holds it in place. When the wagon box is empty the operator turns his crank the opposite way bringing the timbers level and weighs the wagon. Raising the hopper gate allows the wheat to run into cups attached to a wide belt driven by a gasoline engine and is elevated to the top of the building where it is emptied into a short discharge pipe. This pipe can be moved so as to fill any bin desired by turning a wheel below. A four horse team will haul one hundred and fifty bushels of wheat in one load. Such a load, at present is worth more than two hundred and dollars. There are five elevators in town with capacity of twenty five to thirty thousand bushels each.

All through Sept. Oct. and away into Nov. the sky was lit up at night in almost every direction by burning straw stacks. That is the way they dispose of the straw. Horses and cows are fed on ripe sheaf oats. When ploughing stops nearly all the horses are turned out to run at large all winter. Young cattle also run at large in wintertime. At night the dancing lights of the town six miles away look to eastern eyes no more than two miles distant.

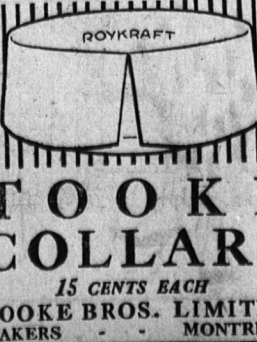

Am spending the winter with my ideal Highlander and his fine family and offspring in the jug of a "feast of reason and flow of soul." The people I have met are big hearted and free. A very short acquaintance makes one feel as if he had known them always.

When the ground was covered with snow in October wild duck and geese descended in thousands on the stocks on farms bordering East Mountain Lake and did a lot of damage, especially to the oats. We are having delightful weather. Since the cold snap about the middle of Nov. the weather has been comparatively mild and seems to grow milder as time passes. There has been no rain and only two or three sprinkles of snow since Oct. 16. One can see black ploughed fields as far as the eye can reach. A HARVESTER
