#### "DOES LIQUOR MAKE FOR INTERNATIONAL UNDERSTANDING?"

Under this heading in the November issue of Alberta Temperance Review, D. L. Marsh, president of Boston University, is quoted (in part) as saying: "A thoughtful person cannot help being distressed at the reports of drunkenness attending diplomatic and international gatherings. News dispatches disclose the peace of things that one of the first things that had to be done for the United Nations Council on the campus of Hunter College was to set up a private bar for the members. It is time for somebody (and I reckon it might as well be anybody else) to call attention to the fact that the members of the United Nations organization would think more highly of getting together if there were less guzzling of liquor by its members—and by the token, the successful working of this last case of the peace of the world would be made more sure."

(Note: Can we hope for Christian Peace in this world when a Liquor Bar set up to serve the members of the Peace Council—but no altar where men may seek guidance from Almighty God?)

#### WINE IN RESTAURANTS?

Churches, Temperance organizations, Intergovernmental Men's Club, A.O.T.E., Young People's groups, Women's organizations, Vancouver Restaurant Association, Union of Municipalities of the World, and other bodies are opposed to the proposal for the following reasons:

1. It would introduce drinking in public places, now banned under Liquor Act.
2. It is an attempt to respectability liquor drinking and put it on the same basis as food. Alcohol is not a true food. It is a dehydrator or hardener of food and hinders digestion.
3. It would camouflage the purpose of a person entering a restaurant and make liquor more easily accessible to the public.
4. It would extend the hours of sale of liquor, now limited in liquor stores and beer saloons. There are no legal limitations of hours on the sale of food, the place would be open possibly seven days a week and 24 hours a day.
5. It would make sale of liquor to minors and consumption of liquor liquor much easier in the curtained or boxed section. Sale to minors is at present prohibited by the Liquor Act.
6. It would make our girl waitresses practically bar-maids, something hitherto not tolerated in this Province.
7. It would mean a general lowering of the standard of restaurants, perhaps a noisy drinking crowd. Would render enforcement of drunkenness, immorality, street accidents and evils of every kind.

#### HANDICAPS ARE MADE TO BE CONQUERED

You and I make our own handicaps in life. We have them because we think we have them. I have never thought of myself as handicapped by illness, writes Alec Templeton, the pianist in "Compopolitan." If you entered in such hampering thoughts as that you are too big, too small, too poor, crippled, blind, or deaf, they eventually take charge of your life. If you order them out the moment they slip in the back way, they cease to influence you.

I was once discussing the question of handicaps with a friend. He was not convinced that we make our own. "Suppose," he said, "you were suddenly to lose a hand. What would you do?"

I told him the story of Count Zichy, a Hungarian, who studied to become a concert pianist but lost his right arm in an accident. At that time little music was available for the left hand alone, so Count Zichy studied composition with Franz Liszt, arranged piano pieces for the left hand and played them at concerts.

My friend persisted: "Suppose you became deaf?"

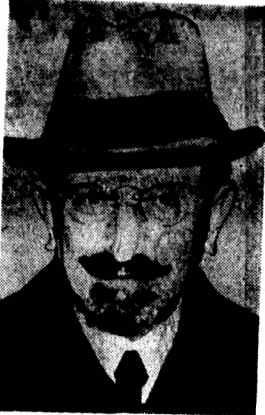

pen to a musician, but I thought of Beethoven. The first symptoms of deafness appeared when he was twenty-eight. At thirty-two he gave up hope of regaining his hearing, but he summoned his hearing-aid and for 25 years thereafter poured out his soul in masterpieces. When I play Beethoven I am not in spite of, but because of, his triumph.

We might look at it in this way. Life on this planet has evolved mainly through hurdling impossible barriers. For millions of years it has been threatened by climatic changes, by lack of food, by the ferocity of fellow creatures. Heat, cold, flood, drought, earthquakes and volcanic eruptions were against it. But nothing appeared at every turn. But nothing has defeated the life principle. Furthermore, it seems to have come up from the slime, not in spite of, but because of, handicaps. How foolish, then, to think of handicaps as crippling.

The Australian Temperance Advocate writes: "If these examples seem far away from our ordinary life, here is one close at hand. For two years after poster work was won by a boy, who never had the use of his hands in the public school and the first and second grades in High School. How did he paint and write? With his teeth. Today he is self supporting at the age of twenty, and keeps up his art work."

## American Can Company To Conduct Closing Machine School Here

#### Commencing Monday, February 17th, and extending over a nine day period the local plant of the American Can Company will operate a "Closing Machine School."

This will be attended by representatives of numerous canning factories throughout the Maritime District, particularly from P. E. I. These men will receive complete up to date course of instruction on the setting, adjustment, and operation of all the various types of machines which they use to put on the top of the cans.

This system of annual instruction has been employed with great success by the American Can Company throughout provinces of Ontario and Quebec for quite a number of years, and it is felt certain that it will aid greatly in helping the Maritime packing concerns to still further improve the high quality of their produce of canned goods. It is in the interests of everyone who uses tin cans that this quality be held at a high level.

This school is being sponsored by two Departments of the Company, Sales and Service, and authority was given early in 1947 by the Head Sales Office in Hamilton, Ontario, to proceed with the project.

Mr. William Brookson, head supervisor of the Closing Machine Dept. American Can Co. Montreal, is in complete charge of the program, having already made several visits to Charlottetown to make layouts and complete plans for the school so that maximum benefits will be received by all attending packers.

#### Complete Equipment

One special large section in the local plant of the American Can Company has been set aside for this purpose, having all facilities such as lighting, heating provided. Nine different types of Closing Machines have been shipped here from Niagara Falls and Montreal, and will be installed in this Department this week so that anyone who attends the school will be able to work on any or all of these machines.

Mr. Brookson has arranged four experts from Montreal plant to be here throughout the course and it will be their duty to give all visiting men a complete instructive course combining theory and practice in the most up-to-date methods of obtaining ideal quality canning results.

Three members of the Sales Department will also attend, headed by Mr. J. H. Archibald, Hamilton Head Office, who will also help greatly in making the school a real success.

The American Can Company is proud indeed to operate a Can Plant in the Maritimes which supplies many of the Maritime's packing plants with cans, and feels certain that the quality of canned goods produced there in the many canning plants will shortly be on par with, if not better, than that produced by other Canadian provinces.

## Cupid Holds Sway

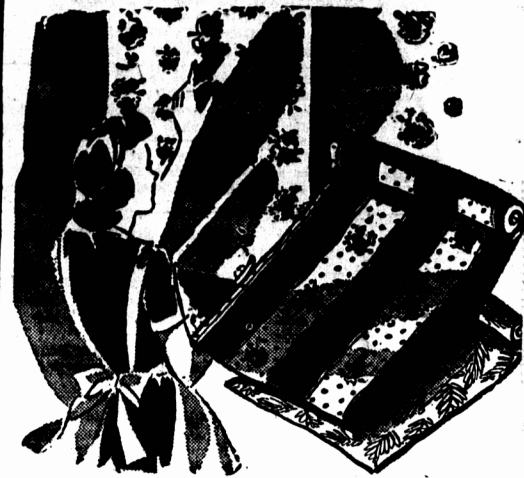

Some say St. Valentine was no more than a modern man's unromantic, dry-as-dust-probers into the antiquity of the ancient feast day of the world's swains and swooning maids. 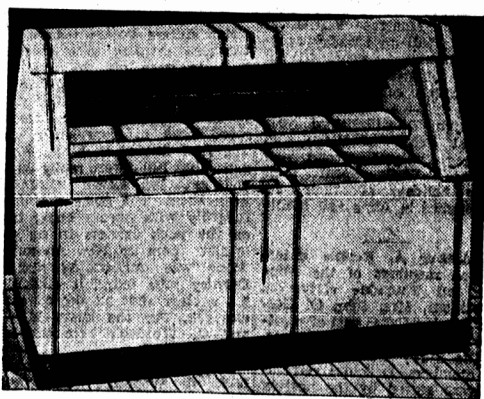
