"A JELLY-BELLIED OLD FLAG-FLAPPER"—KIPLING (Mail and Empire)

Mr. Rudyard Kipling, who is supremely the poet and spokesman of Empire, as presented us, in "Stalky and Co.," with a telling portrait of the politician who resorts to insincere patriotic appeals for unworthy party ends. The speaker is round in person, porcine in appearance, oily in manner and given to flatulent orations.

He was a portly "M.P." and he came down to address the Prep School at Westward Ho, at a time when a cadet corps was being organized amongst the pupils, who were mostly the sons of army and navy officers and overseas British officials. He was received in silence, as the boys did not take to his personality even from the first, and he proceeded in exaggerated, hysterical language to violate the natural reserve of healthy boys regarding their most sacred, innermost feelings. He yapped of honor and glory. He dwelt in hyperbole upon the noble deeds of their ancestors, and adjured them to emulate the illustrious examples thus handed down to them.

He profaned the secret places of their souls with outeries and gesticulations, and they looked "all ways" in their extreme discomfort. They felt that they were being outraged by a fat man. They sat flushed and uneasy in sour disgust. What, in the name of everything caddish, was he driving at? Working towards his

preparation he reached for a cloth-wrapped stick, thrust one and into his bosom and unfurled before them a large, cheap calico Union Jack. And then he waited for the thunder of applause that never came. The boys, as they assembled in groups, after dismissal, called him a "Floppishus cad," a "jelly-bellied flag-flapper," and other names scarcely printable.

We are moved to this synopsis of Mr. Kipling's story by the use that is being made of the patriotic appeal by the status expert whose headquarters, until July 28th, are located on Parliament Hill, Ottawa.

request is not reasonable, owing to their adherence to certain views, they cannot grant us the preference, we shall be free to take our own course. Whether in such a case it would be wise, in the interests of Canada to modify or change the preference, tariff, would be question to be considered. But, putting aside other considerations, if the British Government and people do not show any appreciation of the value of the preference, then so far as the British Government and people are concerned, they cannot complain if we see fit to modify or change that preferential tariff.

Ninety Percent Voting Conservative.

In a canvass in Montreal this week a large transport company found that ninety percent of its workers were voting Conservative. When this information was conveyed to a leading financial and industrialist, he had a private canvass made in his plant and found that seventy percent of his employees were voting Conservative, and of these, three-fourths had voted Liberal in 1926.

Battle For Living Wage.

Reports from British Columbia are that the workers are voting almost solidly Conservative, as scarcely a logging camp is in operation in that Province. The present contest has resolved itself into a battle by the workers for work and a living wage.

Majority Doubled.

Major Gen. A. D. McRae has not been in his constituency, north Vancouver, during the campaign, yet his supporters are wiring him assuring him daily that his majority will be doubled. He has devoted his whole time and talents to National organization. The plight of the Liberal Party, Conservatives count with confidence the defeat of Messrs. McMillan, Ralston, Kay, Dunning and McKenzie. There is no question of the defeat of Messrs. Dunning and McKenzie. Frank Turnbull, K. C., will defeat Hon. C. A. Dunning in Regina by 2,000 and Hon. H. H. Stevens will have an even greater majority in Vancouver centre. Other Ministers in grave danger of defeat are Messrs. Malcolm, Euler, Heenan, Crerar and Stewart. Reports from the provinces continue very optimistic. It looks like a landslide to the Conservative Party. The Conservatives will have a majority over the Liberals in every province but Quebec and Hon. J. H. Ranville reports they will make an excellent showing even in this Liberal stronghold.

Old Age Pension Rights

(Special to the Guardian) MUNICH, Germany, July 25.—The British pilot, Broad, led the around Europe flyers into Munich today, arriving at 9.45 a. m. He was followed five minutes later by Butler of Cape Town. Both reported that they had battled nasty weather. The International circuit flight, to cover 4,637 miles, started from Berlin Sunday with 60 entries. The route covered France, England, Spain, Switzerland, Austria, Czechoslovakia Poland and back to Germany.
