CHICAGO, Dec. 17 (AP)—Detroit Red Wings defeated Chicago Black Hawks for the sixth straight time this season with a 7-1 victory before 15,786 fans tonight. It moved them to within a point of the first-place Toronto Maple Leafs.

The Wings weren't scored on until 19:10 of the third period when Bud Follie hammered in the lone Hawk goal.

Up to that time, they toyed with the Chicago team, on whom they now have scored 37 goals in half a dozen games. The Abel-Howe-Lindsay combination was responsible for four of tonight's goals. Abel and Lindsay each hit twice with an assist apiece while Howe had four assists. Guldoin scored twice and the seventh goal, at 1:51 of the opening period, was counted by rookie Jim McFadden.

62 Nominated For Historic King's Plate

(By The Canadian Press)

TORONTO, Dec. 17—Sixty-two Canadian-bred three-year-olds, largest number in years, have been nominated for the 89th renewal of the historic King's Plate at Woodbine Race Track in Toronto next May, the Ontario Jockey Club announced today. The nominees represent 53 owners who paid the \$15 nomination fee by the Monday, Dec. 1, deadline.

Col. R. S. McLaughlin's Parkwood Stables at Oshawa, Ont., has nominated four entries—two of them sired by Teddy Wrack whose foal won a surprise victory in the 1947 Plate for the McLaughlin colors. C. George McCullough also had four nominations, one being the black colt Banner Worn whose sire Archborn won the classic in 1939.

James Fair of Calnsville, Ont., named three sons of Koentzmark II one of which—Last Mark—won the \$5,000 added Coronation Stakes at Woodbine last fall. Two other top two-year-old performers of the 1947 racing season were nominated—Osodyr, owned by Dr. L. H. Appleby of Vancouver, winner of the \$5,000 added Open Cup and Sancer at the Long Branch meeting; and Joey Bomber, owned by W. J. Fawcett of Toronto, winner of the Clarendon Plate feature at Thorncliffe Park.

Willie Morrissey of Toronto, who was with Buntly Lawless in 1938, nominated The Brat, a bay filly which was a winner in Kentucky during the fall. E. P. Taylor of Toronto nominated Yorkfields, a brown colt sired by Buntly Lawless.

The Plate, run during the spring meeting of the Ontario Jockey Club, is the oldest continuously run racing fixture on the North American continent. At stake are 50 purses, gift of the King, and a total of \$19,000 added by the club. It is open to Canadian-bred three-year-olds, owned by British subjects resident in Canada.

Most of the owners are from Toronto but eight are from Western Canada and three from Quebec.

Glace Bay Miners Release Two Players

GLACE BAY, N.S., Dec. 17 (CP)—Two, South Porcupine, Ont., players have been released by Glace Bay Miners of the Cape Breton Senior Hockey League, it was reported today.

They were centres Lou Prete and Mike Harbul, listed as leading scorers of the Northern Ontario circuit last year.

Miners, Nova Scotia 1946 champions and currently in second place in the three-cornered Cape Breton League, also announced the addition of two new Torontoians—forward Frank Butledge and defenceman Jack Shipshire.

Bruins, Canadiens In Player Trade

BOSTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—Boston Bruins today announced the trade of right winger Joe Carveth to Montreal Canadiens for Jimmy Peters, also a right winger, and the purchase of Johnny Quilty from the same National League hockey club.

Peters, 25, is playing his third season of major league hockey. Quilty, 26, won the Calder Trophy as outstanding rookie in 1940-41, before enlisting with the Canadian armed forces.

Carveth, who plays his final game for the Bruins against the Rangers in New York tonight, was acquired early last season from Detroit. The Bruins traded Roy Conacher for him.

The deal will be effective Saturday night when the Bruins play Canadiens in Montreal.

In Montreal the deal was announced by Canadiens' general manager Frank Selke at a luncheon held by the club for newspaper men and radio announcers. Designed to strengthen last year's League champions, now wallowing in fifth place, the deal brings a Canadian player who has scored 17 points for the Bruins this season—eight goals and nine assists.

Selke also announced that Floyd Curry and Bobby Dillon, forwards at present with Buffalo Bisons of the American Hockey League, will be brought up to Canadiens.

Rangers Defeat Bruins 5-2 To Take Over 3rd Spot In League

NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (CP)—The red-hot New York Rangers, capping a streak in which they accumulated 19 of a possible 24 points through their last dozen games, rode into third place in the National Hockey League tonight by crushing Boston Bruins 5-2 before 14,919 fans at Madison Square Garden.

Chuck Worthy 5th At Toronto

TORONTO, Dec. 17—Chuck Worthy and Purple Valley, both from the Hirsch Stables of Sydney, N.S., were the favorite horses entered in the Dufferin Trot which resumed here today with a good crowd on hand despite cool weather.

Chuck Worthy, favorite in the feature \$300 three-heat third race, won the opening minutes of the second half, followed by Purple Valley, who captured the event with two firsts and a second.

Bonny G., driven by Keith Waples, set a new season record for six and a half furlongs, in the first heat of the feature, with a time of 1:44. She ran second with a first and two thirds.

Purple Valley, entered in the two-heat fifth event, was last in both heats after leading the field by a large margin in the second heat only to break on the home turn.

P.W.C. Hoopsters In Upset Victory Over Navy Team

Walter Goss' fast-breaking P.W.C. hoopsters scored an upset victory last night defeating Navy 40-35 in an exhibition game at P.W.C. Auditorium.

Navy, led by Cullen and Langille, swept into an early lead only to see the winners stage a rally which carried them to a seven-point margin at the half, which ended 23-16.

Football Coach Out Of A Job

DETROIT, Dec. 17 (CP)—Charles E. (Gus) Dorais, one of the originators of the forward pass in football, found himself out of a coaching job after the first time in 30 years today when Fred L. Mandel, owner of the Detroit Lions professional football team, announced his removal along with line coach Joe Bach.

Mandel said he had offered Dorais a "substantial settlement" to resign but that Dorais "turned it down."

The contract, calling for \$25,000 a year, has four more years to run.

Find No Fraud In Lamotta-Fox Fight

NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (AP)—The New York State Athletic Commission declared today that it has found no evidence of fraud in the Jake Lamotta-Billy Fox fight at Madison Square Garden Nov. 14, The Twentieth Century Sporting Club was ordered to pay both boxers their purses, which had been withheld.

Fox, a knockout specialist from Philadelphia, was accused of fouling Lamotta a beating, forcing the referee to stop the contest in the fourth round. Because of persistent reports that Lamotta had not fought, the Commission ordered both purses of \$23,910.22 held up.

Subsequently Lamotta was suspended from boxing until he had entered the fight without disclosing that he was suffering from a spleen injury.

The commission's announcement said nothing of Lamotta's suspension.

Queen Square School Hockey League Started

Teams B and C of the newly formed Queen Square School Hockey League came through with opening victories this week as the league got underway with Team A being the victims in each case.

In the opening encounter played on Monday afternoon Team B led by diminutive Art Hughes, who shot three counters, sent A squad down to a 6-3 defeat. The winners had to come from behind an early two goal lead of their opponents but a four goal outburst gave them a lead they never relinquished.

Protest Ban On Hockey Broadcasts

HALIFAX, Dec. 17 (CP)—An untimely storm of protest from hockey followers, Alderman J.E. Lloyd, member of the Forum Commission which banned radio broadcasts of hockey games in an attempt to increase attendance, said it was "all a mistake."

The ban was imposed yesterday. "That's today," he said, "so far no game has been kept off the air as no Maritime Senior Hockey League matches are scheduled for Halifax until Friday."

Letters of protest poured into CJOH, the Halifax station that broadcasts the games. Most of them came from shut-ins and from veterans at Camp Hill Military Hospital.

The Daily Star quoted Tommy Gorman, manager of the Ottawa Audubons, as saying that radio broadcasts boosted attendance, made new fans and were regarded in Ottawa as good promotion.

Alderman Lloyd said he would ask for an immediate meeting of the Commission, whose chairman is Mayor J.E. (Gee) Aherne, to reconsider the ban.

Loss Second Straight Game

Team A lost their second straight league game when Team C, who yielded an early goal to their opponents, came on with three straight goals and finally won out 5-2.

The winners led by the Punch Line of H. Hennessey, Burke and Nicholson controlled play the entire part of the game, with Hennessey potting three of his team's five counters, Burke and Nicholson getting the other two.

Sonny Stull, this year playing up on the forward line, accounted for both the losers' goals, with Beverie and Cannon drawing assists.

Protests Hockey Played By Leafs

BOSTON, Dec. 17—Manager Art Ross of Boston Bruins said today he has protested the brand of hockey played by Toronto Maple Leafs because, he said, it has included "holding, interference and extra men on the ice in all their games with us."

Ross said he informed Clarence Campbell, president of the National Hockey League, of his charges the morning after the Bruins and Leafs battled to a 1-1 tie last Sunday night.

"We're not protesting the scores of the games but the Leafs are just breaking the rules," he said.

Moncton Wins 6-1 From Truro Bearcats

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 17 (CP)—Moncton Hawks, a one line team so far this season, proved tonight that with all three lines clicking they are one of the hottest squads in the Maritime Senior Hockey League by trouncing league-leading Truro Bearcats 6-1.

The defending Maritime champions threw three hot lines at the Bearcats tonight, and all three figured in the scoring as the white shirts applied the strongest pressure they have shown all season. They banged in one goal in the first period, three in the second and two more in the final frame.

Hawks ace sniper Buck Whitlock was held to one goal and two assists as his team-mates divided the scoring among them in a game that saw all but one of Hawks forwards figure in the goal scoring plays.

Bearcats were without the services of star forward John (Kink) McDonald who was kept out of action by a leg injury picked up in Halifax earlier in the week. Hawks also were a man short, playing without Raymond Leger, burly defenceman who is out of action with rib injuries received in a collision here last week with Phil Metcalfe of Halifax Crescents.

Biggest blow to Bearcats hopes of winning tonight's encounter came midway through the second period when big Frank Grabowski was struck in the face by a puck. Six stitches were used to close a deep gash in his upper lip.

Will Ask Change In Boxing Legislation
