He estimated the value of the hall and its contents at \$1,000. The store itself he valued at \$3,500 and the contents at between \$1,000 and \$1,500, which is only partly covered by insurance. The loss is a heavy one for Mr. Ramsay and much sympathy is felt for him. S.

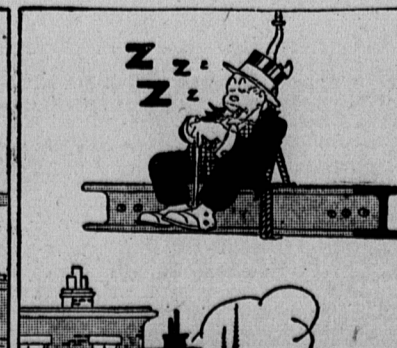

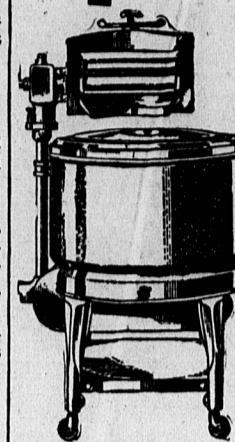
STERLING WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Halifax Mayor

Opens Campaign To "Give-a-Job"

HALIFAX, April 1.—(C.P.)—With its objective the procuring of work for the jobless of Halifax, Mayor Audley A. Thompson has instituted a "give-a-job" campaign which is already meeting with considerable success.

The idea behind the Mayor's plan is to bring unemployed men into contact with householders and others who have small jobs to be done which require a day's work or so and which call for unskilled or semi-skilled labor.

Within a few days after its inception, His Worship began to receive calls from citizens anxious to cooperate. Scores of men have been placed at work gardening, cleaning

yards and cellars, building fences and doing other odd jobs of a similar nature.

So heavy has become the demand for their services that the mayor has put a card system into effect to keep tabs on the work. Before going out on a job, each man is given a card which he is required later to return with a signed statement that his work has been satisfactorily done.

Mayor Thompson is hopeful that his idea will spread into other centres of the province and he feels that a widespread campaign along the same lines as is being carried out in Halifax would help in any measure to lessen unemployment throughout Nova Scotia.
