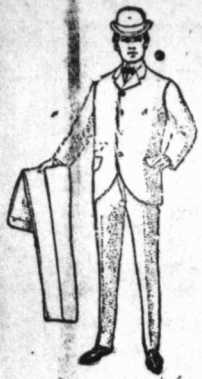

A public meeting was held in Morell Hall on Tuesday, 7th inst., to take action in a matter that interests all. William Aylward of Bristol occupied the chair. Robt. N. We must stand together for the driving out of the traffic from this vicinity. Give the dealers fair warning when if they persist in their nefarious traffic they must only take the consequences. Fred Mosher, constable, received a very threatening letter of personal violence if he had not give up his office. The letter was typewritten and signed "A friend." The party who wrote this letter had made a mistake in their man and the letter will just have the opposite effect from what was intended. Mr. Mosher has been a temperance man for over thirty years and can be depended on to do his duty and any parties who attempt to interfere with him will make a very serious mistake. The following resolution was put to the meeting and unanimously carried:—Whereas prohibition of the sale of liquor is the law in this County and whereas during the past six months several parties have been selling in this neighborhood, and whereas the officers appointed and paid by the Government to look after this business have utterly failed in their duty; Therefore resolved that the Government be asked to withdraw these officers to do their duty at once or appoint men in their stead who will do so. A paper with the following heading was then placed on the table and all who were willing to enroll themselves as a Vigilance Committee were invited to do so. We hereby pledge ourselves to do all in our power, honorably, to drive out the liquor business by giving any information which we may get from time to time to the proper officers.
