Sir,—In your Saturday's issue I note a lengthy report is given of the proceedings at the annual meeting of the Temperance Alliance held in the Y. M. C. A. on Friday last.

There is no doubt, but that a call was made to the many faithful Liberals who were present in large numbers, including many (Liberal) members of the present government as well as the law partner of Premier Saunders.

It has been quite evident to our people for some time that the present Alliance is simply an off-shoot of the Liberal party who have used it as a political football as occasion requires, and in this particular case the call was most urgent as the party had sufficient warning that their pet ally was likely to be sacrificed on the Altar of Homicidal Prohibition, and all future hope of gaining power again through this intermediary would be destroyed.

In a recent article dealing with present Temperance Legislation he is quoted as saying:—"Referring to the idiosyncrasy of the clerical mind he makes particular reference to the legislation now in force in the United States which makes it a crime to drink a glass of beer, and concludes his remarks by saying that the clerical mind does not seem to be happy until it has found desperate wickedness in some perfectly harmless act." My only objection to this is he might have included some "legal minds". How true the above applies to the campaign carried on in our Province only last June when the clerical minds were instrumental in defeating the only sane legislation that so far has proven to be of any success in furthering the cause of true Temperance, and we are to judge from the remarks of the Rev. A. A. McLeod, these gentlemen are already badly out of tune with their pet policies of last June.

TEMPERANCE LEGISLATION

Sir,—In looking over your report of the Temperance Alliance annual meeting, there is a clause in which Mr. Wm.
