Verdict For Plaintiff In Damage Case

The case of Reid vs MacDonald and Acorn, action for \$1,000 damages, was concluded in the Supreme Court yesterday, the jury, after an hour's deliberation, returning with a verdict for the plaintiff for \$547.50 against both defendants. The Court adjourned until 11 a. m. Thursday.

In charging the Jury, the Chief Justice stated that the case had taken up the attention of the Court for seven days. A great deal of evidence had been heard from both the plaintiff and the two defendants, some of it of much importance and some of no consequence whatever. This action was brought against the two defendants who were not only defending themselves against the plaintiff alone but against each other.

The plaintiff says that he is a carpenter, defendant Acorn is an owner of a taxi business and defendant MacDonald a Hotel Keeper and contractor. The plaintiff says that on December 21st, 1928, he went to Acorn to get a car to convey him to the Railway Station. The Court pointed out at this stage that the plaintiff did not see Mr. Acorn at all. The plaintiff went there in the morning and saw somebody who was in Acorn's employ and who was attending to the office at that time; yet the Master is responsible for the action of his servants, so when he engaged a servant of Mr. Acorn's he engaged Mr. Acorn. It is the duty of the taxi owner to see that he has competent drivers, suitable cars and that his customers are taken safely to their destination.

The plaintiff contends that the car of Acorn's was so carelessly and negligently driven by a servant of the defendant Acorn that he collided with the car of defendant MacDonald which he also claims was negligently and carelessly driven.

When the collision occurred plaintiff was hurled against the side of the car, received a wound on the head, bruised bodily and injured for life. He claims that the servant of Acorn had no license, contrary to the Motor Vehicle Act. The plaintiff claims that either one or both defendants are responsible.

The defendant Acorn denies everything except the first statement which has to do with each of the defendant's occupations. Mr. Acorn puts in a further defense, claiming there was contributory negligence on the part of the plaintiff, also that it was an inevitable accident; that is, something that could not be helped. The court pointed out that the latter plea has no weight whatever. On the contrary it was an accident that never should have happened for such a well lighted, paved and wide street with any amount of room for two cars to pass.

It was the Jury's task to decide upon whom the blame for the accident should fall. What was the plaintiff, as one of the public, entitled to when he hired the taxi? The evidence showed that the driver of the car was under 16 years of age, the age limit being 17. The driver is required to have a chauffeur's certificate, and be of good character, for life is jeopardized by reckless and incompetent drivers in automobiles. The best car mounted on wheels is a menace to the public when driven by an incompetent driver. Moreover, in this case, the driver had no permit. He forged his own name on his brother's permit and admitted he had quite a lot of fun deceiving the police. It was one of the most amazing tales the court had ever heard. This young lad drove out with the car and passenger and in a few minutes drove into a violent accident. It is for the jury to judge whether this accident resulted in the injury of the plaintiff and if so, to assess the damages to which he is entitled. Some one was at fault, not this man, Reid, he was at no fault. He came out of it suffering some injuries. Dr. Ledwell had plaintiff placed in Hospital for he was suffering from the effect of shock and concussion of brain. Sometimes a person suffering from concussion does not know there is anything the matter with him, a complete lapse of memory resulting, claimed Dr. Ledwell. The plaintiff was three weeks in the hospital, after which he received medical treatment at home. The patient showed the scalp wound which represented the external mark where the injury to the brain was received. The plaintiff according to the defendant MacDonald, said something about "feeling all right" after the accident. But these words can not be used against him, because a blow on the head might affect his mind. There are several

The Markets

(Canadian Press)
MONTREAL, Que., June 30—Butter and cheese prices advanced while egg and potato quotations were unchanged on the produce and dairy market here today.

Fresh number one pasteurized butter gained a quarter of a cent at 20 1-2 cents a pound. To retailers solids and prints were unchanged at 22 and 23 cents a pound. Receipts were 8,522 boxes.

Ontario cheese advanced an eighth of a cent at 11 1-4 to 11 1-2 cents and Quebec was up from an eighth to a quarter of a cent at 10 5-8 to 10 7-8 cents a pound. Receipts were 8,522 boxes.

Fresh Ontario and prairie eggs in cartons were unchanged, extras being quoted at 22 cents, firsts at 17 to 17 1-2 cents and seconds at 15 1-2 to 16 cents a dozen. Carlot prices of British Columbia fresh extras and firsts were 23 cents and 18 to 18 1-2 cents respectively. Quotations to retailers were unchanged and receipts were 5,195 cases.

New number one Montreal potatoes were quoted at \$2 per 80 pound bag and number 2 at \$1. New number 1 United States potatoes were \$4 to \$4.50 per 100 pound barrel. New Brunswick green mountain old potatoes, in cartons per 90 pounds bulk were quoted at 85 cents to \$1 and to retailers per 80 pound bag were the same price.

OTTAWA, Ont., June 30—Some slight firmness on egg markets is reported from some quarters today although prices generally are still unchanged.

MONTREAL—Egg receipts here today were 5,195 cases. The market continues quiet and unchanged with western eggs still offering at extras 22, firsts 17 1-2 cents, seconds 15 cents, and eggs of this grade are selling to wholesalers on spot at as high as 15 1-2 to 16 cents.
