UNIQUE WINDOW DISPLAY.—One of the most attractive window displays shown in this city for some time is that of the Two Macs, Great George Street. An excellent model of the great "tank" land monsters used at the front is the central figure and key note of the display. The tank is made up by linked cigarette boxes. It is also self-contained track and the formidable "guns" are cigarettes. The tank has passed over a German "trench" leaving a wake of guns, debris and hors de combat Germans, and are awaiting the approach of the German trench, the occupants of which are showing dire consternation and are awaiting the approach of the monster with uplifted hands. The window display is now being shown in the Maritime Provinces for the first time. It is the invention of Mr. T. Dickenson, of the Philip Morris concern, who based the work upon his actual knowledge of the tanks, having seen them in the training depots in England.

EXCELLENT EQUIPAGE.—Citizens in general and horsemen in particular were strong in their praise of the magnificent span and luxurious carriage which was driven through the city yesterday by Mr. C. W. S. McClure. The equipage is the property of a prominent manufacturer in New York, N. S., and has been sent to the Island for wintering, as evidently the fame of the province as a place for feeding and fitting horses has gone beyond the straits. The span of horses are hackneys, pure blooded and registered with the American Hackney society. They are a perfect match, dark bay in color, patently identical markings and the same height, both geldings. They were bought in Chicago, Illinois and now have some 35 first prizes to their credit having never failed to win first in their class in all the important shows at Chicago, Indianapolis, Cleveland, Rochester, New York and Philadelphia. The harness they wear is of the finest quality and would easily cost \$350.00 on the wholesale market today. The carriage they are hitched to is an undercut show buggy with solid leather cushions and top. This is without doubt the finest in driving horses and equipment that has been shown in the city and needless to say Mr. McClure was the cynosure of all eyes yesterday some of them not little bit envious.

ELUQUENT LECTURE ON INTERESTING TOPIC

A good audience assembled in Grace Church last evening to listen to the Rev. Mr. Barraclough, deliver his lecture, "On the Trail of the Great Pathfinder in Central and South Africa", supplemented by an account of the campaign now being waged there.

Very vividly were the almost insurmountable difficulties that the intrepid Livingstone surmounted, portrayed. The burning missionary zeal of this servant of Christ and his consuming love for Africa and its people were fully set forth. The great work performed by him in his efforts to suppress the slave trade was fully described. Touching references were made to the death of his wife, to the meeting with Stanley and to the missionary explorer's own death.

The parts of Africa occupied by the different European powers were shown, the means by which the powers came into possession explained. As in Europe so here Germany was confidently prepared for the conflict. Treachery amongst the Boers had been fostered by what would seem to be Divine interposition.

The lecture was very fully illustrated by excellent stereoscopic views. The lantern was managed by Mr. W. E. Burke in his usual capable manner. A vote of thanks moved by Lt. Col. E. S. Moore and seconded by Dr. J. A. Ayers, was tendered the lecturer by the chairman, Prin. J. D. Seaman.

CITY TO INVEST \$10,000

(Continued from page one.)

The order for an overcoat for Policeman Doyle was authorized. The City Clerk then read the following report of Mr. W. P. Doull, which had been submitted by the lighting committee:

MR. W. P. DOULL'S REPORT ON STREET LIGHTING.

To His Worship the Mayor and City Council:

Having been engaged by Councilor Jenkins as Chairman of the Lighting Committee to make test and report on the electric lighting of the City streets, I beg to report as follows:

I have made a large number of tests of both the voltage and candle-power at various times throughout the last month, at times in company with others, and at other times alone when no one knew. Also through the courtesy of the Company officials I have had access to and have examined the daily records of voltage, etc., which are automatically recorded. Those records are for the full twenty-four hours.

Accompanied by a representative of the Company, the Chairman of the Lighting Committee and a private citizen I drove all over the City, making a general survey of the lighting. There are three or four places where additional small lamps appear almost necessary, but on the whole Charlottetown may be considered to be a fairly well lighted City.

The voltage is kept excellently steady. Dominion statute allows a variation of four volts above or three below the declared voltage. The declared voltage in Charlottetown is 110, but the usual meter reading is 111 to 112, very rarely a volt more or less, except the momentary fluctuation when a motor is cut in or out. I have records of a few years ago where the variation between the hours of 5 and 11 p. m., was fully fifty volts. That, however, is a thing of the past.

The more important matter for the citizens is the candle-power or illumination of the streets. The City contract calls for inclosed arc lamps, consuming a certain amount of current, at a certain voltage. That description was used to require of the Company the installing of the best apparatus and methods then on the market. Since that time science has produced wonderful improvements in both apparatus and methods. The arc lamp as described is now obsolete and discarded, difficult to keep in good working order, and more difficult to replace in whole or part. The nitrogen filled tungsten inclosed lamp (usually called high-efficiency) is a great advance on the arc at its best. A number of these have been used to replace defective arcs. Numerous photometer tests on the streets show that in every case where the high-efficiency lamps are installed the City is getting 50 per cent more light than from the best inclosed arcs in use. To be exact the average from all the tests show 66 per cent additional light from the new lamps. The City is that all have not been changed.

It has been argued that the Company would effect a saving in current by the use of the high-efficiency lamps. In theory that is correct, but in practice this saving is offset in part or whole by the greater cost of lamp renewals. This however is a point that would require a year's experience to determine exactly.

I have been asked to verify or confirm the statements made at the last Council meeting regarding the number of arc lamps still in use. I find by actual count there are 53 arc lamps and 23 high-efficiency now in use.

CITY TO BUY VICTORY BONDS.

Mayor Brown then made the proposal that the city make some use of its idle money by investing in the Victory Bonds. He showed that there is \$22,800 to the credit of the civic sinking fund which will not be needed to cover any expense—really unworking capital. It is simply drawing bank interest and it would be good business and also patriotism to use some of this money to further the Victory Loan. He had seen the bankers personally and they assured him the City ran no risk in investing in these bonds—neither from the fear of tying up money, nor the possibility of an increase in loan interest. It was good investing, good business, sound patriotism. He called for the opinion of the Council and each member was fervent in his appreciation of the proposal. A meeting will be held at a later date to decide the matter, but the investment on the part of the City will assuredly be \$10,000 and probably \$15,000.

Coun. Ledwell brought up the matter of a woman dying of typhoid fever, and the infected house still stands unfurnished, with two dogs at hand to spread the germs of this disease. The Health Officer stated the

woman in question had only a mild form of typhoid and the only way to fumigate the house would be to burn it down.

After a lively discussion between the Medicos the Mayor ordered the Marshall to have the two dogs destroyed and later, on suggestions from Coun. Smith and Wright, it was decided to notify the present owner of the house—the son of the deceased woman—to have the place attended to.

Coun. Rattray brought the attention of the Street Committee to the condition of Kent Street, approaching the P. E. I. Hospital and Mayor Brown remarked on the condition of the street crossing at the west end of Dorchester street, near Rochford. These will be attended to.

Coun. McNevin called the attention of the council to the need for an assistant to Mr. Matheson, care taker

of the City Hall, equipment and vehicles. It was moved and approved that Mr. S. Crockett be appointed to this position, under the direction of the City Engineer.

On motion of Coun. Wright Council adjourned.

There are also 79 small lamps rated at 32 c. p.

In view of existing facts I would suggest the advisability of a reconstruction of the lighting system and apparatus.

My proposition would be to replace all the remaining arc lamps with high-efficiency lamps, but of smaller wattage than those now in use, but giving fully as much light as the present arcs, and from the saving replace watt tungstens. Such can be arranged, giving from 15 per cent to 20 per cent more light from the large lamps and more than doubling the light where the small ones are doing duty. Such arrangement would give more light all over the City, and give the advantage of a system which gives a clearer, steadier and better light. I have no authority from the Company to promise it, but from conversation when discussing its feasibility I am persuaded that the change can be had without any extra cost to the City.
