DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

The owner and driver of Lady Lee 220 1-4, winner at Georgetown recently should have read John A. McGuigan, Saint Mary's Road and not George McGuigan. Mr. McGuigan has sold Lady Lee to Mr. W. A. Toombs, Kensington and she will be prepared for the 225 Class at Charlottetown by Myron McArthur. Well, Mr. McGuigan has sold a good pacer and Mr. Toombs has bought a good one and we congratulate them both.

W. A. Toombs is one of our most popular horsemen. He is always cheerful, the same in victory or defeat and nobody loves a horse more than he does. He will be remembered as owning the fast but erratic Teddy Jackson 215 1-2 and Peter Keyes 212 1-2.

The track record trotting was broken by Addie McGraw in the first heat of the 215 Trot at New Annan Wednesday, when she stepped in 2:11 3-4, supplanting the five year old record trotting of Fred Medium 2:11 1-4 made in the 120 Trot and Pace August 8th, 1928 when he won the second heat in 2:14 3-4.

It was in a race with Major Aubrey that Fred Medium made the record. Major Aubrey won the first heat by half a length from Fred in 2:15 1-2. Fred came back and won the second heat in 2:14 3-4 and the Major won the third heat by two lengths in 2:14 the fastest of the race.

Major Aubrey was a pacer, then, we think, in his five year old form. He had been purchased for a small sum by Wellington McNeill that spring and came very quickly to his speed, winning six out of eight starts and taking a record of 2:11. He is a son of Colonel Aubrey, trial 2:05, and in the opinion of a great many horsemen one of the greatest and gamest pacers we have produced.

The same day the above race took place Tarzan Grattan lowered the record pacing to 2:12 3-4, driven by Monte Gerow. He did not start at the Provincial Exhibition here but later on raced at the Provincial Exhibition at Halifax and won the first heat of the Free-For-All from Lambert Todd in 1:08 3-4, lowering the track record several seconds, where it remained until 1931 when it was reduced by Eula H. to 2:08 flat.

The track record at New Annan is now held by Marjorie M. 2:07 3-4 who won the 215 trot and pace there a year ago in straight heats. Lucky Lindy being second each trip Billy Cope, Phil B. and Grandma were also starters, best time 2:09 1-2.

Darkey Grattan came very close to Marjorie M.'s time in the first and third heats Wednesday, each of which were stepped in 2:10 flat. Johnny Conroy told us after the third heat that had he thought of the track record he felt he could have lowered it the third heat as Darkey was quite comfortable.

Referring again to Major Aubrey, his first start made at Saint Peters in 1928, resulted in defeat, due largely to his having suffered from a severe attack of distemper. However, he won the first heat and established a new track record of 2:14 1-4, which has since been lowered by Billy Cope to 2:13 1-2. Bud Arkworthy was a starter in the race, which also had Bingen Aubrey, Dixie Marque, Marge Direct and Aubrianna. The Major and Bud went away flying to the half, reaching there in 1:04. Bud made a break and the Major went on and won. This effort took considerable out of him in his weakened condition and Bingen Aubrey came on and won the next two heats in much slower time. Major Aubrey was sold the next spring to Mr. Wilson of Sydney Mines.

We heard a great many complimentary remarks regarding the beautiful stallion, Bellini Scott 2:09 1-2, owned and driven by William McKay of Kensington, and by the way, Mr. McKay was very attractively attired himself with a nicely fitting golden brown riding coat and cap. Bellini Scott is a son of Peter Scott 2:05, one of the greatest race horses and biggest money winners that ever went down the Grand Circuit and a sire of several two minute performers.

Bellini was lightly campaigned as a four year old on the Bay State Circuit where he had to race against the very best trotters in Eastern United States. As an evidence of his capacity we note that in the 220 trot at Northampton on October 4th, 1932, Bellini Scott was two, two, two, in 2:10 1-4, 2:10 1-4, 2:09. Dr. F. W. Christopher who knows all the horses that race in the Bay State thinks very highly of this horse and believes he will be a big factor in his class at our Exhibition races.

It was regrettable that May Tell was lame in her start at New Annan Wednesday, from an injured tendon. This mare is a real trotter and if she gets sound again will 2:12 sure over Charlottetown track. We hope she will be O.K. for Exhibition.

It must have been more than interesting at North Sydney on Wednesday when Marjorie M. and Calumet Brownie hooked up in their special match race for \$500. a side and a \$250. purse, total \$1,250 to winner. The race was best three in five. That is the winner had to win three heats. The first and fastest heat of the race was won by Calumet Brownie, Billy Hood up, when he stepped to the half in 1:03 and the mile in 2:09 3-4, setting up a new track record for a Cape Breton track, supplanting the former record of 2:10 made by Marjorie M. on the same track July 1st. The second heat was won by Marjorie M., and the third heat was a dead heat and the fourth and fifth were won by Marjorie M., the fifth and final heat being in 2:17. A bad kind of a race for fast horses, one that is liable to cost them for all times.

We notice where our old friend, The Incense 2:09 1-2, a trotter formerly owned by Charles Reardon of this city, was the winner of the Free For All at North Sydney the same afternoon and stepped one of his winning heats in 2:14 3-4, which shows that he must be pretty good.

The third race on the program was won by Tippy G., driven by Charlie Sweet, best time 2:18. She is a brown mare by Peter G. sire of Toll Gate, Star G. and other good performers and was imported from Ontario. Her best performance last year was on October 10th when she won the third heat in the 225 trot and pace at North Sydney in 2:21.

They are taking to the pari-mutual form of betting in the Eastern States like a duck takes to water. We note where at the sixteen day trotting meet which is being carried on by Allan J. Wilson at Rockingham Park, N. H., that on Tuesday \$60,390. was bet on the

Maritime And Upper Canadian Stars Send Entries For Local Tournament Next Week

The biggest tennis event in the history of this Province will begin next Monday morning at the Charlottetown Tennis Club Grounds, Victoria Park. Laird Watt and Georges Leclerc, last year's finalists in men's singles, will not be present nor the brilliant "Bev" Piers, but new stars will appear in the persons of Douglas Grant of Halifax, who already this year defeated Nova Scotia's 1932 and 1931 champions, Piers and McLennan respectively; R. T. Barnard of Montreal, who ranks in the same class as Laird Watt; Hon. P. Aitken (son of Lord Beaverbrook), England, who presently resides at Liverpool, N. S.

- Chief among last year's spectacular performers are Commander J. C. I. Edwards, who this year was finalist in the Eastern Canada Championships played at Ottawa, beaten only by Marcel Rainville; Harry Roper, brilliant Halifax left-hander, who with "Bev" Piers won the Provincial men's doubles crown last year; W. L. Rennie, of Toronto, 1931, provincial champion and former Dominion champion, who is playing back to form this year, and Charles Peters of Montreal, who defeated W. L. Rennie here last year.
- Miss Mary Currie, present ladies champion, will defend her title against Miss Effie Billing, Quebec Province champion, and Mrs. H. L. Beer and Miss Phyllis Rykert of Ottawa. Mrs. Beer and Miss Rykert are present Provincial ladies doubles champions and Mrs. J. C. I. Edwards, who is a newcomer and as dangerous as the best in Canada. Ladies events will be particularly interesting. Unfortunately Mrs. Dr. Woodbury, Halifax, last year's semi-finalist, is unable to be present next week.

Sport Briefs

The American track team which is touring Europe continued their sweep of victories by winning seven of eight events against the best German athletes at Hamburg, Germany, Tuesday. Glen Cunningham of Kansas, defeated Dr. Otto Peitzer, former Olympic champion and record holder in the 800 metres run, Ralph Metcalfe, great American negro sprinter, won both the 100 and 200 metre dashes. Johnny Morris of Louisiana, won the high hurdles and Ivan Fuqua of Indiana, the 400 metres in 48.6 seconds. George Spitz won the high jump with six feet. The only German win was the shotput where Hans Severt defeated the American John Anderson with a winning toss of 49 feet 8 1-2 inches.

The fastest three year old mile paced this year was that of Logan Scott the same day and same track when she won the first heat in 2:01.

Joe Wright, Jr., one of the greatest amateur carmen Canada ever produced and former winner of the Diamond Sculls at Henley, who defeated the best amateur carmen in the United States in 1927, will endeavor to repeat the feat at Connaught Ranges Monday, August 14th, and conclude on Friday or Saturday, are expected to get in touch with Lt.-Colonel C.
