MONTREAL'S ELECTRIC DEAL.

By a recent deal the Montreal Light, Heat and Power Company has obtained control of the Lachine Hydraulic Company, which was producing light and power on a large scale. The combination now includes the Montreal Gas Company, the Royal Electric Company, the Montreal and St. Lawrence Light and Power Company and the Imperial Electric Company, together with the Hydraulic Company above mentioned. The Montreal Herald fears the result may be to affect the business and industrial interests of Montreal adversely. A great monopoly is created, because the combination controls nearly all the available water power around Montreal by which electric light and power can be cheaply produced. The Herald says that over one-half of the capital stock of the combine will be represented by water, and on this fictitious value the public will be made to pay dividends for all time to come. It is quite within the mark to say that ten millions of dollars would far more than replace every dollar that has gone into the various amalgamating companies, but interest on over twenty millions will be collected. This must mean much to a great manufacturing city like Montreal, in which cheap light and power are so vital an element of prosperity.

that is politically possible. Germany, the latest and the most aggressive of the naval nations, is in a very different situation. A navy, large or small, is not vital to Germany. It is however, to the aggressiveness of Germany 'upon the water' that the competition and rivalry to which the Secretary of the British Admiralty refers are mainly due. Distinctly our own naval expansion is traceable to that source. A quarter of a century ago we had not afloat a single ship of war which was 'up to' that 'date.' As the historian of the troubles in Samoa has explained, it was the attitude of Germany in those troubles that founded the modern navy of the States. It was intolerable to us that we should be without the means of resisting the aggressions to which it then and there became plain that we might be exposed, and to which it seemed equally plain to many of us that we should be exposed unless we were prepared to resist them. Another lesson of the same kind was given to us from the same quarter twenty years later, and we have lately had still another. It is accepted as a political axiom in Washington that we cannot afford to be inferior to Germany upon the sea.

France and Russia are, relatively to Great Britain, where they were a generation ago in naval strength. The disturbance of the balance of sea power is in the German and the American Navy, and it has been occasioned by the creation of the former. Even now a plain declaration on the part of Germany that she did not regard any part of the American continents as a field for conquest and colonization, and that she renounced the pretension of controlling the destiny of any American State, would enable us to reduce our navy, not indeed to the flotilla of tubs which constituted its quarter of a century ago, but to less than its actual and to much less than its projected dimensions. Certainly that would be the result if such a German declaration were accompanied with such an earnest of its sincerity as would be afforded by a reduction of the German naval programme. The main source of the "great competition and rivalry," so far as it is recent, would thus be removed. But meanwhile it is quite true that Great Britain cannot afford to dispense, not merely with naval superiority, but with virtual naval supremacy. The huge new fleet of seventy-one "all" that will be under construction in British yards on the first of next month will be the premium the islanders pay for national insurance.

TWENTY-THREE KNOT SERVICE.

MONTREAL, March 18.—The Board of Trade council today, respecting the government's invitation for proposals for the performance of a fast line service between Canada and Great Britain, decided that anything short of a 21-knot service would be most unsatisfactory and detrimental to the commercial interests of Canada.

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GREAT BRITAIN'S NAVAL PROGRAM

One Hundred and Eighty Millions Asked For

Caused by Growth of German Sea Power—United States Building War Ships for a Similar Reason.

(New York Times 17th.)

In introducing his enormous and unprecedented naval budget of \$180,000,000, Mr. Arnold Forster yesterday took, in the House of Commons, a deprecatory, almost an apologetic tone. "He could not help regretting that the great competition and rivalry in the matter of naval armaments continued to make necessary this enormous and unproductive expenditure."

It is thoroughly understood, both within and without Great Britain, that the maintenance of British sea power is literally vital to that country. No other of the great Powers is under the same compulsion to maintain a fleet which can defy, not only that of any other Power, but the combined fleet of any reasonably imaginable alliance. Whether the "three-Power basis" contemplates a too improbable contingency is for Britons to judge. What is evident is that a country which imports two-thirds of its food and has never a "visible supply" in the island for more than a few weeks cannot afford to be at the mercy of any naval coalition.
