In spite of the rainy weather quite a number of the College Students, as well as most of the Professors, assembled at the A. A. A. Grounds yesterday afternoon for the P. W. C. Field Day. Owing, however, to the heavy rain, after a couple of events, the sports had to be postponed till finer weather. Capt. McKinnon, Mr. Riley and the Professors kindly acted as officials for the 100 yards dash, the 1 mile run and part of the high jump event.

Lauchlin and Mrs. McCallum, Dunstaffnage, entertained a number of their friends one evening recently. Among the number present were quite a few from this city who drove out in the early evening. The evening was spent in games and dancing and the party broke up about two o'clock in the morning. All those present spoke in highest terms of the kind hospitality of the host and hostess who spared no pains to entertain their guests in a highly enjoyable manner.

At the Board of Trade Rooms in this city last evening an impromptu meeting was held to hear the address by E. B. Biggar, Toronto, on the Transportation Problems of Canada. E. T. Higgins, the President, presided. In the course of his excellent address Mr. Biggar pointed out that "while the recent elections settled the question of reciprocity, the problem of transportation is just what it was." He showed that the people of the west are now suffering, along with the people of the Maritime Provinces, from unduly high rates, transportation, express and telegraphic are in excess of comparative distances in the U. S. A. by a percentage ranging from 10 p.c. to 125 p.c. These are the cause of dissatisfaction to both peoples and make the cost of Eastern Canadian goods particularly high in comparison with similar articles in the United States. A reduction of only one cent a bushel could be had on grain rates it would mean that upon wheat alone there would be an increase of \$2,000,000 and if a similar reduction were made on rates east to west a saving of hundreds of thousands of dollars annually would be saved to eastern farmers and manufacturers. The net price of apples would be increased by 80c per bbl on shipments to certain points in the Northwest is rates were the same as those prevailing in the U. S. A. The rates were a handicap to the commerce of the Island and it was an outrage that the cost of shipping oats from E. B. I. points to Sydney should be nearly double that prevailing from Montreal to Sydney, a distance three times as great. He referred to this discrimination against the province and saw even a greater handicap was worked in the rates between extreme eastern and western points. He strongly advocated the government ownership of a transcontinental line by the expropriation of the G. T. P. or otherwise. He urged the P. E. Island people to unite with the other Maritime Provinces in an agitation to remedy these evils and compel the government to render justice to this people. After remarks by other speakers and a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Biggar, the meeting adjourned.

Gussow, Ottawa, Dominion Botanist, who has been in Kings and Prince County investigating the diseases in trees, will be present at the opening of the exhibition today and will deliver an address. Mr. Gussow found that the trouble with the fir trees in King County was a bore which was getting in its destructive work. In Prince County a fungus, which can be controlled by spraying was destroying the leaves of the cherry trees and killing them. In his trip east and west Mr. Gussow was accompanied by Prof. J. A. Clark, City.

Farker Hooper and Michael Thomas, of the Charlottetown Abegweits, who competed in the Maritime Championships on Saturday last, did not capture their events. The quarter mile in which the former was entered, went to Mr. W. Sheppard, the time being 49 2-5, 1 1-5 secs behind the Canadian record. In Thomas' event, the 3 mile run, J. J. Daly of the Irish Americans, won out in 14, 58 1/2, the record being 14, 58 3-5. In the pole vault Bill Halpenny formerly of the Abegweits, carried off first place, vaulting 12 feet, 2 inches. He then went after the Canadian record, 62ft, 5 in, but although he got over the bar on his third attempt, the number car on his back which had worked loose, displaced it as he was coming down and the jump was not allowed. Eller of the Irish Canadians won the hurdles with Frank Lukeman, well known here, who was running unattached in second place. The time 15 3-5, equals the Canadian record.

Borden, Canada's next prime minister, passed through Amherst on the C. P. R. today. That times have changed was evidenced by the fact that the C.P.R. stopped long enough here for Mr. Borden to receive a right royal welcome from the band of large number of conservatives, who, at short notice assembled at the Amherst station to greet him and congratulate him on his victory. Mr. Borden was received by Mr. Rhodes and a number of other prominent conservative workers. Mr. Borden was shouldered and carried along the station platform for a short distance and then returned to Mr. Rhodes' car and delivered a short address. He thanked the people of Cumberland for returning Mr. Rhodes to parliament, and also compared the victory of 1911 with that of 1878, when a great landslide of votes swept the Liberal party out of power. Mr. Rhodes also spoke briefly and pleasantly and urged the citizens present to gather together harmoniously, to forget political issues, and to labor together for the upbuilding of their common town.
