IMPROVED CONDITIONS NOTICEABLE

Hon. E. N. Rhodes and Hon. H. H. Stevens Return to Ottawa With Encouraging Reports.

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Oct. 29—Two Cabinet Ministers returned to Ottawa over the week-end, after by-election campaigns in widely separated districts of the Dominion with encouraging reports of conditions.

Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance, took part in the Restigouche-Madawaska, N. B. campaign, afterward going on to spend a week in Nova Scotia, his native province.

Hon. H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce, campaigned for the Conservative candidate in MacKenzie, Sask., and then made a brief tour through the three Prairie Provinces.

Sees Improvement

Mr. Rhodes found conditions in Nova Scotia "relatively improved," he said. Practically all the lumber stocks in the Province had been disposed of and woods operations this year promised to be carried on more extensively than for many years.

The fishermen were enjoying a favorable reaction to the trend of conditions in the United States and were getting higher prices for their products. Mr. Rhodes said, while farmers and fruit growers were also enjoying improved conditions. The Annapolis Valley apple crop suffered from two storms but not so severely as had at first been the belief, and good prices were being received.

Mr. Stevens spoke encouragingly of conditions in the west where he found a hopeful and constructive spirit among the people.

It Ottawa yesterday the news of settlement of the wage dispute between the Running Trades and the Canadian Railways, was received with much gratification in Government circles.
