Dominion Income Tax Returns

This year the Dominion Government has imposed very heavy penalties upon persons sending in incorrect returns.

For instance:—If the income is understated up to one-tenth the real income the fine is 10 per cent interest on the deficiency.

If understated by more than 10 per cent but less than 20 per cent the fine is HALF THE AMOUNT OF INCOME OMITTED.

If the deficiency is 20 per cent or more, THE WHOLE OF THE UNREPORTED INCOME IS TAKEN.

A false statement may be punished with a \$10,000.00 fine and six months in jail.

If late in sending in return 25 per cent is added to tax.

You must not wait till asked for tax, nor leave the calculation of its amount to Government officials. You must ask for proper form.

All returns must be in by April 30th next, accompanied by at least one-fourth of actual tax reckoned liable for.

Take no chances. Your return must be perfectly accurate to avoid HEAVY PENALTIES. Do not delay. Attend to this important matter at once.

THE MARKET—Some exceptionally fine specimens of Island celery for this time of year was shown in the market yesterday by Miss McKinnon grown at her farm in the Royalty and was very favorably commented upon. There was a fair market. Eggs were retailing at 40 cents per dozen on the lowest for some time. Chickens were selling from \$1.00 to \$1.40 each and ducks at \$1.50 each. Other commodities were unchanged in price.

BOARD OF TRADE.—At a meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade and the City Council last night, the proposed renewal of the contract between the government and the Telephone Company was discussed. The consensus of opinion was in favor of renewing the contract for five years, under certain conditions. Mr. J. O. Hyndman was appointed a delegate from the Board of Trade to go to Ottawa to urge the completion of the standardization of the P. E. I. R. Mr. Paton previously appointed, finds that he will be unable to go.

SEEK BUSINESS UPON EVERY SEA

The Canadian Government Merchant Marine vessels, which were built to develop the Canadian trade, have been forced to enter into the general carrying trade of the world, as a result of the commercial depression. William Phillips, European manager, said that the vessels were being sent from British to Scandinavian ports and also to Holland and Germany, with a view to keeping them employed until the Canadian export trade revives. Now that the Swedish liner Buenos Aires has successfully completed a shipment of Western wheat from Vancouver via the Panama Canal, the Canadian Government boats will be put into this service. It is also intended to develop Canadian business with Southern Ireland through Cork.

THE IRISH QUESTION.—The present Irish question must be settled by debate, discussion and decision in which the ordinary deceptions are observed, or will never be ended," the New York World says in an editorial dealing with recent lectures on Ireland by Sir Philip Gibbs, and Father Duffy, an ardent Sinn Fein sympathizer. These two men occupied different auditoriums at the same time, and to large audiences "this is what they said regarding each other: Sir Philip Gibbs—"Father Duffy is a gallant man, a gentleman and a sportsman." Father Duffy—"Sir Philip Gibbs is a friend of mine. I admire him very much for his personal qualities and for his work." The World continues: "By thus proving that an Englishman and an American of Irish blood who favors the 'Irish Republic' can discuss the future of the hapless island in a kindly spirit, maintaining the courtesies of debate while sharply disagreeing as to politics. These eminent debaters have rendered a service to their countrymen and blood brothers in a troublesome time."

Reports Of Women's Institutes

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

RED POINT.—The annual meeting of this club was held at the home of Mrs. John S. McInnis on March 7th. There were twenty women present. A paper on the care of hard-wood floors was read. The election of the officers followed, most of the old officers being elected. Despite the fact that only nine months' work is represented in this institute year the Red Point Institute accomplished much. A concert was held in October at which \$70.55 was made. A new kite was made and placed at the entrance of the school. A cupboard was made and placed in the school and the full lunch equipment was installed. The seats and benches have been repaired and the blinds have also been fixed over. A pump has been placed in the school grounds and proves very satisfactory.

CAVENDISH Women's Institute held its regular meeting at the home of Mrs. L. B. Toombs on March 16th. There were thirty-one women present. The meeting consisted of a Sing-Song, reports of committees, a paper on "Social Life in Rural Communities", discussion on school problems and the serving of refreshments. A committee was appointed to confer with the trustees as to the advisability of placing a pump in the school. A large and enthusiastic meeting was held and after the meeting was adjourned a pleasant social time was spent. Three new members have been added to the Institute.

EAST POINT Institute held its regular meeting at the home of Mrs. John F. McDonald on March 10th. This was the Annual meeting of the club. The officers of the past year were re-elected. During the nine months just completed \$10 was voted for the school fair and \$30.50 for school repairs. \$75 was voted for the building fund of the new church.

MALPEQUE.—The annual meeting of this Institute was held in the institute room on March 10th. There were seventeen women present. A demonstration on Short Cuts in Housekeeping was given. During the year a circulating library was started by the members. The efforts of the Institute on behalf of the school children have been appreciated and commended by all interested. A great interest has been evinced by the women of the district, and many young people have been added to the membership list for the year. In December the members of the Institute sold candy at a pie social and \$24.30 was realized. \$92.74 was made at a concert under the auspices of the young people. \$74.30 was expended on institute furnishings. Altogether this has been a most successful year for the Institute.

GEORGETOWN'S Women's Institute held its annual meeting in the Council Room on March 3rd. There were twenty-three women present. Miss Carruthers, Assistant Supervisor was present. The election of officers resulted as follows: President, Mrs. J. W. McPherson; Vice-President, Mrs. Maurice Dona van; Secretary, Mrs. W. W. McLaren; Directors, Mrs. Seymour Knight, Mrs. Frank Solomon, Mrs. Estelle Aitken, Miss Ethel Morrissey; Auditors, Miss Alice Compton, Mrs. Elmer Jenkins. In the nine months there have been seven regular and two special meetings held. A committee from the Institute was appointed to superintend the work being done in the primary room of the school. The room was kalcimined, new blinds were bought, also zinc for under the stove, the black-board was painted and the room was thoroughly scrubbed and the windows and desks cleaned, at a total expense of \$39.49. In September, at the request of the Exhibition Association the Fair grounds were again a circulating library was organized, the books being all contributed by the members and friends. A new cook-stove was purchased for the hall.

VICTORIA.—The organization meeting of the Victoria Institute was held in the Victoria Hall on March 16th. There were twenty-two women present. Miss Carruthers, Assistant Supervisor, acting as chairman. A talk was first given on the objects and work of the Women's Institutes, after which it was moved, seconded and carried that an Institute be organized in the district of Victoria. The election of officers then followed: Pres. Mrs. Donald Murdochson; Vice-Pres. Mrs. (Dr.) Doherty; Sec. Mrs. K. C. Hblim; Assistant Sec. Miss Trowsdale; Directors, Mrs. Jabez Lea, Mrs. Baswell, Mrs. Calvin Howatt; Auditors, Mrs. H. R. Proffit, Mrs. Claude Taylor. Sick committees and school committees were then appointed for the month. The next meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Doherty on April 30th. All the women who are interested in the work of the Institutes are cordially invited to be present.
