Gas Economy

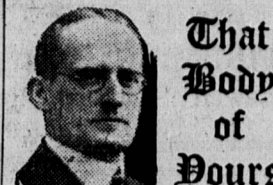
If a piece of sheet iron, of any desired dimensions, is kept in a convenient place to the gas range, one can keep two or three vessels warm, instead of using extra burners.

MEANEST FORM OF HEADACHE

One of the meanest forms of headache is that known as migraine. It comes on one side of the head over right eye, accompanied by great depression, nausea, and often vomiting.

Later however it has been thought that fatigue, eyestrain, or some disturbance of the ductless glands causes migraine.

However in the Boston Medical and Surgical Journal, Drs. McClure and Huntsinger tell us that in a series of twenty-one patients with migraine and usual intestinal symptoms, that there was poisoning due to liver disturbance.

And from the British Lancet we learn that Dr. H. C. Rook of London, believes that a great many of these migraine cases are due to poisoning from some liver disturbance, which is produced by over-eat or insufficient action of the liver.

He finds that migraine occurs chiefly in people with a highly sensitive nervous system, and poisons often pick out and attack certain portions of the nervous system.

This treatment is taken about once every two weeks, or at least once a month. The day or half day before the salts are taken is a starvation day. Certain foods must be limited, that is eggs, chocolates, cocoa, coffee, and alcohol.

Genius Pays Homage to Genius

REMINISCENCE OF NEW YORK'S LOVE OF MUSIC (Historical)

About thirty years ago after the death of Patrick S. Gilmore the subject report appeared in nearly every newspaper in the United States.

As this is the musical season we offer an apology for recalling this tribute to a bandman who died crowned with fame. We too have had and now have bandmen who have won eulogies for their ability we cannot claim that they are or were not all Gilmores, nevertheless, they made the world better.

The journal referred to, reads as follows: "At the Manhattan Beach Hotel last Sunday, eighty admirers of the world's famous bandmaster Patrick Sarsfield Gilmore, listened to Henry Waterson, the famous Southern orator's tribute. It was also decided to hold a series of concerts in all the larger cities of the United States, which will be inaugurated by that to be given on this coming Sunday, July 29, at Manhattan Beach, the scene of Mr. Gilmore's musical triumphs. Mr. Waterson said among other things:

A Series of Concerts.

"A series of musical performances in commemoration of the late Patrick Sarsfield Gilmore has been arranged to be given in the larger cities of the country. The first of these performances will be had here at Manhattan Beach the coming Sunday, July 29. The others will follow in the early autumn.

"With this brief statement I might take my seat confident that the public will do the rest; but before I sit down I must risk my heart of some of its burdens of memory. The last twenty-five years of his life, Patrick Gilmore and I were very close friends. He had sympathized with the mischance which had diverted me from what, he thought, might have been a successful career in music to one in another calling, at that time quite beyond my aspirations and hopes.

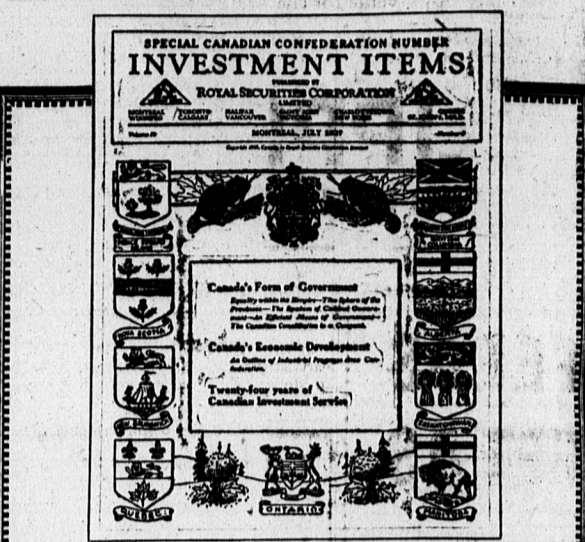
