Winnipeg Seeks Relief From Responsibilities

(By The Canadian Press). WINNIPEG, Dec. 6.—Municipal responsibilities have so increased in recent years without any corresponding increase in revenue that Winnipeg will not be able to balance its budget this year, quite apart from relief costs, J. Proudhon, Winnipeg city solicitor, told the Rowell Commission today.

For the past five years the city's credit had been so poor it could not be relied upon to carry a half of its "burden" by the Bank of Montreal. Now even that could not be criticized. Something drastic had to be done by the end of the month, or Winnipeg would be without funds to finance relief.

Remedies suggested included: the city to be relieved of all unemployment relief costs, including past relief debts, and old age pension contributions; the city to receive substantial grants toward education and police, as in other cities; the city to collect taxes on the province's municipal undertakings; the province to turn over part of the gasoline tax and automobile license revenue to the city.

Doctor Offers Rules For Avoiding Colds

With the annual high point in the number of common colds occurring regularly in the late fall season Dr. Robert A. Fraser, Chief Medical Director of the New York Life Insurance Company, offers ten rules that will help men, women and children avoid this widespread malady. They are:

- 1. Get plenty of sleep, fresh air and sunshine. 2. Eat all the nourishing food you need, but avoid overeating. 3. Dress sensibly and with regard to the climate. 4. If you get wet, change to dry clothing as soon as possible. 5. Breathe through your nose, not your mouth. 6. "Cleanliness is next to godliness." Bathe daily. 7. Avoid constipation. 8. Get outdoor exercise every day. Long walks are excellent. 9. Avoid sudden changes of temperature. 10. Keep away from people who have colds.

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Sees Airlines In Operation By Midsummer

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 6.—Indication that airlines of Trans-Canada Air Lines would be flying the continent from Vancouver to Toronto and Montreal by mid-summer was given by J. A. Wilson, comptroller of civil aviation, dept. of transport, Ottawa, and a director of Trans-Canada Air Lines, in an address given Saturday evening before the Royal Canadian Institution during which he outlined the history of the establishment of the airlines throughout the Dominion. By use of slides and maps he showed the progress made and Canada's Premier Geographical position in the world as a possible future center for both trans-Atlantic and trans-Pacific flights.

It has been too often claimed that Canada has lagged behind other nations in the development of its airways. Mr. Wilson declared, "When we examine the situation we submit that this charge can be refuted. It is true that we have not progressed so far in the inter-city air traffic, but this fact is easily explained when we examine the situation. Other nations at the conclusion of Great War when they found themselves with Great War time aviation equipment turned them into inter-city air communication. Mr. Wilson said, Canada, however, adopted an even more practical solution, one of much greater benefit to the country when the airplane was put to work in the development of the great North Country, also for use in forestry work and exploration and, lastly commercial uses. Today, he said Canada has the greatest self-sustained aviation force in the world and dollar for dollar no country has received as great benefits. "The records of our aviators for safety, courage and determination are unequalled," he continued. In describing the establishment of the Trans Canada air lines and the work necessary to provide its complete operation in inter-city air communication Mr. Wilson declared it was one of the greatest aviation developments in the world. Today there are about 101 airmen in Canada just about finished and will be operated between Vancouver and Winnipeg and by mid-summer to Toronto and Montreal. Five Lockheed-electras are now in use two were in regular service between Vancouver and Seattle and three were engaged in training of Canadian pilots mails he said will have the preference of all services and schedules will be made so that mail would go through to its destination in the least possible elapsed time. In concluding Mr. Wilson showed by map the unique position occupied by the Dominion in the air routes for Trans Atlantic and Trans Pacific service air routes to the continent lay over Eastern and Western Canada. Aviation is merely in its infancy, he remarked, and he doubted anyone could yet attempt to visualize the tremendous strides that await in the future. "We know that Trans Atlantic surveys have been this year and that mail services between the two continents are now a matter for the future. Passenger traffic is but a step behind. There will also be a direct connection with Trans Canada airlines. We see the same short, quick route to Asia. That, however, is again a matter for future speculation.

Beyond the desirability of a short route, with necessary ports and landing fields, a most desirable condition which the present Trans Pacific route does not enjoy it would be impossible to say more. In the meantime we can but look at the map of the future as we may choose.

BEWARE OF PANACEAS "Regardless of the claims that are made for various 'cure alls', there is at present no real 'cure' specific for the common cold," Dr. Fraser declared. "During the past few years serum treatment and vaccines have been used to great extent, and while these treatments do aid some people and confer short time immunity on some individuals as a general rule they are not effective."

"Irradiation with ultraviolet rays has some value, but it is also doubtful that it benefits in the majority of cases. The use of cod liver oil in various forms is advised by some physicians, and in children this remedy does seem to have some effect."

WHAT TO DO Dr. Fraser feels it is best to be just as soon as you feel a cold coming on and isolate yourself from the rest of the family as much as possible. Rest is more important than medicine. Take a hot bath and then get into bed with plenty of covers. Drink freely of water and fruit juices. A mild laxative is advisable and the cold has disappeared."

(From a London correspondent) measure with any finality the effects of stopping and starting on the crankcase bearings of a car. The engineer now has a definite demonstration of the behavior of metals under every conceivable stress and load. One of the most famous firms of scientific instrument makers represented at the forthcoming B.I.F. is that of Cooke, Troughton, & Simms. Thomas Cooke, as Samuel Smiles related, began by making a magnifying glass, out of the bottom of a thick glass tumbler, and it was Cooke and his four sons who built, in 1860, one of the first motor cars. This steam-driven car used to roar along the Yorkshire roads at 15 miles an hour to the great delight of the populace and the terror of the legislators who commanded a speed of not more than four miles an hour and an advance guard on foot whose job it was to wave the red flag. Cooke's surveying instruments helped to make the great trigonometric survey of India in the early 19th century, they played a notable part in the building of the Aswan Dam and the Forth Bridge, and today, the "Geodetic Tavistock Theodolite", which is to be shown for the first time at the B.I.F., is being used to complete a new survey of England. It is interesting to note that the instrument used at Greenwich for recording and observing the positions and movements of the sun and stars (by which the captain on the high seas finds his exact position) and checks the time of his clocks) was made by Edward Troughton. This instrument, which is vital to the world's navigators, has just been replaced by the firm which Edward Troughton helped to establish and will occupy an important place in the brilliant display of modern instruments at the British Industries Fair.
