Greco Wins Convincing Fistic Victory Saturday

MONTREAL, May 9 (CP)—Johnny Greco, the Montreal soldier boy, came marching home Saturday night with the most convincing victory of his meteoric fistic career, when he defeated Terry Young, New York's "dead end kid," over 10 rounds at the forum.

Waking Montreal fight fans with a long slumber, the little fellow attracted a crowd of 9,267 that contracted over \$18,000, the best house since the days of the colorful French-Canadian brawler, Les "Kid" Roy, back in the '20's.

Sponsored by the Canadian Army, with proceeds going to the army sports fund, the card was the best seen here in years.

Before Benny Leonard had made his move from the center of the canvas when the 10th round came out swinging and that was

to be the order of the day. Young was warned in the opening canto for a low blow that didn't phase Greco who pummeled his opponent with sharp, clean lefts in the second round.

Young went down on one knee in the third when Greco landed a left body smash and that seemed to give the Montreal boy confidence for from there he handled him self well and returned the cleaner blows and more of them.

Greco neatly made it "curtains" in the seventh. A sharp left hook slashed below Young's heart and he showed fast. Jimmy bounded in to lay on the leather, but over-anxiousness for the kill enabled Young to bob and weave out of harm's way.

The soldier boy had a two-punch lead in weights, coming in at 136.

Count Fleet Wins Easily

BALTIMORE, May 9 (AP)—The Count cask-walked Saturday to the tune of "Maryland, My Maryland" even easier and snappier than did "My Old Kentucky Home" a week ago.

Following up his three-length romp in the Kentucky Derby, Count Fleet just about ran off and hid this time in the 43rd running of the Preakness Stakes.

Mrs. John D. Hertz's lightning streak led command of the Preakness track from the word "go" was five lengths on top after a mile and he breezed the rest of the way to hit "Go" at the wire with "eight lengths in front of the Simmonds" Akron-owned Blue Sticks, who is practically making a habit of being the Fleet into port this spring.

Blackpool Wins Cup

LONDON, May 9 (CP Cable)—Blackpool Saturday won the League match that will give it a ticket for the World Cup final in a two-game, total goals series that wound up the British Major football season.

A crowd of 47,000 turned out at Sheffield to watch Blackpool take the second game of the series 2-1. The first game ended in a 2-2 tie.

Blackpool scored a few minutes before half time and went two goals up early in the second half. The Westsides cut the margin by two goals in the final minutes before the final whistle.

LONDON, May 9 (CP)—Gen. Henri Giraud tonight told the people of France that "tomorrow the fortress of Europe will be entered," and he asserted that the light "will be hard but not long."

He urged the people of his Nazi-occupied homeland to wait "until we are ready to hit jointly from east and west."

Much Committee Work In House This Week

OTTAWA, May 9 (CP)—Some intensive committee work lies ahead for members of Parliament in the coming weeks.

Some of the committees have been set up but none has made much progress with its work. On Friday the House Radio Committee was appointed but its work this year is not expected to be as heavy as in the past.

German Troops Move Southward

ANKARA, May 7 (Delayed)—(AP)—German troops are being moved southward through Hungary at a rate comparable to that which preceded the Axis attack on Greece and Yugoslavia, travellers arriving in Turkey from Europe reported today.

German authorities have ordered Rumanians to dig deep air-raid shelters and to be ready to evacuate their civilian population of the Balkans, and the Italians are feverishly strengthening their defenses.

Retail meat dealers in Charlottetown will be introduced to the new standardized method of cutting in a demonstration to be given by W. R. McNeill at his butcher shop on Granston Street Tuesday evening.

Mr. McNeill recently returned from a cutting course in Toronto where he was selected as one of the few in the province. The standardization of cuts was decided on when meat rationing was first introduced in this province. It is expected that other centres in the province will also be visited later by Mr. McNeill.

Tuesday night's demonstration will begin at 7 p.m.

A Royal Dukedom Ends

With the death of the Duke of Cornwall, the last of the royal title become extinct, he having no heirs. There are Royal dukes in the British Commonwealth, but the Duke of Cornwall is the only one of the British Royal Family since before the advent of Queen Victoria, who was the daughter of the Duke of Cornwall. There are many royal dukedoms, some now, some old have ceased to exist. In the earlier days of the family of King George V and Queen Mary the sons were called Prince Edward, Prince Albert, Prince Henry and Prince George; but in course of time, after Edward became Prince of Wales the sons were known as Dukes. Prince John, who died suddenly in 1919 when he was 13 years of age.

Most of the Royal Family, however, have lived to good old ages. Queen Mary will be 78 next month. There are few monarchs left, but of these the King of Sweden is the 85th year and extraordinarily active, still enjoying his game of tennis, and the King of Victor Emmanuel is in his 74th year.

regiments also converged on the main streets. Earlier, Provost Corps reinforcements had been placed at strategic points. Many officers in battle dress and carrying revolvers also were on the streets.

Finally, with tension high, whistles were blown. Officers and non-commissioned officers halted various units. The men of one regiment were ordered to fall in on main street. Marched off to camp, the unit broke ranks momentarily but the officers gained control.

Officers of the other regiment assembled their men on Church Avenue where trucks were waiting. The troops, ordered into the vehicles, were then taken back to camp. Other men were rounded up by the Provost Corps at restaurants and elsewhere while others were ordered back to camp as they left a theatre.

Flt. Lt. H. H. Millar, wireless operator; next-of-kin, father, Alexander Morris, Storrton, Ont.

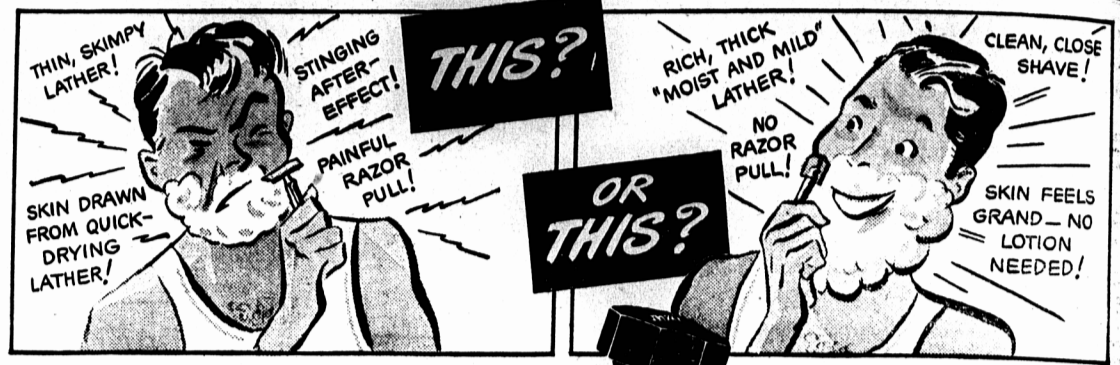

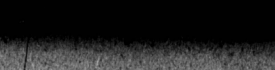
