3 Charlottetown Sub-Lieutenants For Naval School

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—(CP)—Selection of the first class of probationary sub-lieutenants for training at the new naval officers' training establishment at Hatley Park, near Victoria, B.C., was announced at Naval Service headquarters tonight. The class of 100 includes 18 ratings of the Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve who have been serving on the lower deck and have been recommended for commissions. The new training establishment under the command of acting Commander M. Grant will open Jan. 22 and the probationary officers assigned to it will undergo intensive training for at least three months before leaving for duties afloat or ashore.

The young men who will undergo training for permanent naval commissions in the first class come from all parts of Canada. The list includes: Gordon R. DeBlais, Royal H. S. S. and Robert Montague, a. l. Charlotetown; W. R. Cannon, Summerside, P.E.I.; F. G. Elkin and T. H. Burden, of Saint John, N.B.; G. P. Crosby, of Redbank, N. B.; F. S. Higgins, R. K. Lynch, F. R. Norman, G. E. Tibbo and P. Rowlands, all of Halifax, and J. R. Leslie of Bridgetown, N.S.

Two Italian Troopships Are Torpedoed

LONDON, Jan. 17.—(CP)—The Athens radio today announced that the Italian troopships Liguria, 15,354 tons, and the Lombardia, 15,354 tons, have been torpedoed and sunk in the Adriatic.

The Greek radio said its information was obtained by Italian fishermen in the Greek hands. Lloyd's register lists an Italian "Liguria" of only 174 tons, and no Italian vessel named Lombardia.

One killed, two Buried in mine

TIMMINS, Ont., Jan. 17.—(CP)—One man is dead and two seriously injured following a cave-in at the Hollinger Consolidated Mine workings near here early today. One man was buried. The body of Fred Doucette, 45, was recovered shortly after the accident. Workers tonight still were digging and tapping in the vicinity of the cave-in, in an attempt to discover whether the other two men caught in the slide were still alive. Two men buried were believed to be J. B. Minard and K. Leino although mine authorities did not name them.

Hear record Anti-aircraft Fire in London

LONDON, Jan. 18.—(Saturday)—(CP)—German raiders swooped in on London shortly after midnight and soon the explosion of falling bombs and roar of the anti-aircraft batteries could be heard in the city.

The attack came after earlier raiders concentrated on a West England district. This time was met by the heaviest anti-aircraft fire ever reported from the district. Bombs were declared shaken, not by bombs, but by the fury of the ground defences.

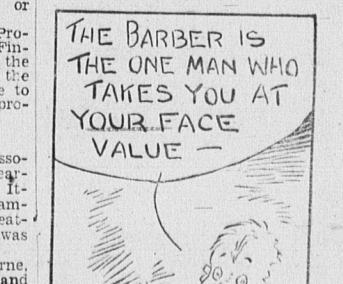
