

BRITISH WOMEN WILL SOON VOTE

LONDON, May 8.—A petition against granting the parliamentary franchise to women containing 53,000 signatures was presented in the House of Commons yesterday. Twenty-two thousand of the signers are women. Sir George Kemp, Liberal member for Northwest Manchester, moved the second reading of his Women's Enfranchisement bill in the House of Commons this afternoon. The bill gives the right to vote to women householders on a municipal basis and removes sex disqualification. A married man and his wife, however, cannot vote in the same constituency. The second reading of the bill was carried by a majority of 167. The affirmative votes included those of Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, Sir Rufus Isaacs, the attorney-general, and Sir John A. Simon, the solicitor-general, in the Government, and the entire Labor party. The moving of the second reading of the Women's Enfranchisement bill in the House of Commons today was celebrated tonight at enthusiastic meetings of Suffragettes. Christabel Pankhurst told a crowded gathering at Kensington that they must fill the lobbies of parliament with Suffragettes until the bill was carried. They must not shrink from any sort of political pressure. A resolution that the Premier facilitate the enactment of the bill at the current session was carried with acclamation. At another meeting Dr. Martin pointed out that the Conciliation bill in 1910 passed the second reading by a majority of two to one, whereas the majority today was three to one.

COULD SAVE 1,000 LIVES A YEAR.

MONTREAL, May 8.—Dr. Laberge, head of the civic department of contagious diseases, has sent a report to the controllers recommending that a camp to accommodate tuberculous patients be established on Mount Royal. He states that the disease is making such progress here that stringent methods must be taken and that a properly equipped camp would probably save one thousand lives a year.

MOTOR OCEAN GOING SHIPS BEFORE LON.

LONDON, May 8.—The Standard's Berlin correspondent telegraphs that according to a statement issued today by the Hamburg-American Steamship Company the first ocean going motor ship will make her maiden voyage from Hamburg to New York towards the end of this year. Light ocean-going ships, equipped with oil motors, are being constructed in Germany and are expected to inaugurate a new era of sea travel. The new ships will be devoid of funnels, so their appearance will add a new and strange feature to the maritime highways of the world. Two motor ships are being built for the Hamburg-American Company, one of 6,380 tons displacement, by the Wesir shipbuilding yards and one of 5,500 tons by Blohm and Voss, on the Elbe.

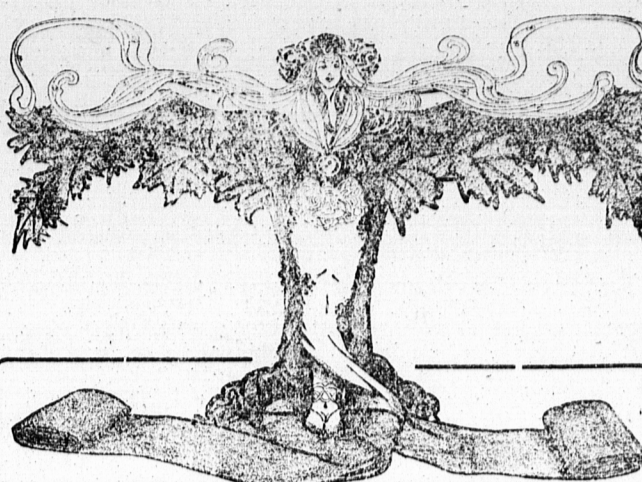
