THE FIRE ALARM.

A proper fire alarm system is a very important adjunct to the Fire Department of all modern progressive cities. It should consist of an alarm line connecting the boxes distributed about the city with the central fire station and also with the homes of all the firemen, so that as soon as a fire is discovered the central station and every fireman can be instantly notified. Months ago the fire boxes were abandoned and since then the sole dependence has been upon the line utilised for the purpose of notifying the firemen. It now transpires that this line has not been in working order for weeks past and is still unworkable. This wire is in one circuit and if broken or out of order at any point the whole becomes useless, as it is at present.

The situation is this: Should a fire break out in the night in a distant part of the city, in a house or premises not having telephone service, the only available way to notify the central fire station would be by running to that point. Then the big bell would be rung, and such of the firemen as it might wake from a sound sleep would promptly run to the point of danger. These are anything but satisfactory conditions. They are such as are entirely primitive and better befitting a country village than a provincial capital. Surely no time should be lost in putting in order that portion of the system by which the firemen can be promptly rung up in their sleeping rooms. We think most of our citizens will agree with us that the entire system of fire alarm boxes ought also to be restored.

As it is the poles and wires which form the connection with the old fire alarm boxes are anything but creditable to the City, and if no further use is to be made of this part of the system they ought to be removed. They have long been an eyesore, and especially since the Light and Power Company, with praiseworthy enterprise has set up good poles and painted them, the city fire alarm poles present a dilapidated and discreditable appearance. The wires also have become a source of peril from their liability, in their present tumbledown condition, to cross the electric light wires and so cause danger or death to unwary persons passing along the streets. The matter of the fire alarm should receive the immediate and earnest attention of the council. Fires have been happily infrequent of late, but it will not do to lulled into false security in our present sadly unprepared condition.

Our heartiest felicitations are extended to Dr. J. T. Jenkins and Mrs. Jenkins on the celebration of their golden wedding which took place yesterday. The golden anniversary is a rare, auspicious and happy event in itself. It is the more so when around the inner circle more immediately concerned there gather the tributes of sincere regard and esteem from so wide a circle as rejoice with Doctor and Mrs. Jenkins in this instance. He has taken a hearty interest in all public affairs, including its healthful sports and pastimes. May we add the closing lines of what Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes wrote on a similar occasion thirty years ago: Good grant you many and happy years, Till when the last has crowned you, The dawn of endless day appears, And Heaven is shining round you!

THE GUARDIANS OF THE PEACE.

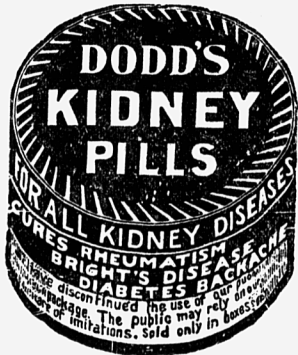
The word "police," derived from polis a city, expresses in itself something of the important relations which subsist between the guardians of the peace and the community they serve. The Marshal and the men under his command have multifarious duties which cover the protection of the persons and property of peaceful citizens, the preservation of public order, and the apprehension of offenders. In all these matters they act for and on behalf of the great body of citizens.

Their powers are necessarily larger than those of private individuals, their responsibilities greater, and their duties bring them frequently in contact with the lawless, violent and disorderly elements which exist in greater or less measure in all communities. For all these reasons policemen ought to be possessed of more than average strength and courage, as well as a thorough knowledge of their duties, and a full sense of their responsibilities.

It is obvious that in the right discharge of their varied duties the police force should have at all times the hearty sympathy and support of the community by whom they are employed and whose interests they guard. This is the more essential because their duties from time to time involve exposure to more than ordinary perils and violence. And such support and sympathy, where it exists, tends also to the better performance of their duties, and, indirectly to the better order of the city and its greater peace and security.

We think our small police force is and has been as a body worthy of commendation from our citizens and the press. In Marshal Cameron they have a capable and efficient head, thoroughly conversant with the duties and responsibilities of the force, and experienced in his work, having risen from the ranks to his present position. The officers and men of the force perform their duties well, are reasonably alert and active without being over officious. They maintain good order, and life and property are no where more secure than in our city. They fairly fulfil the conditions of inspiring a wholesome fear among the lawless, while they hold the respect and confidence of law abiding and orderly citizens.

It is announced that King Edward will meet his nephew, the German Emperor at Berlin today. The meeting cannot be other than an important one, in view of the estrangement that has existed between the two sovereigns and the two nations for some time past. It is evident that King Edward is making advances toward the restoration of a better feeling, which it is hoped may be effected.

KING NANA WILL SEE HIS HOME

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Nana, who was King of Benin in 1891, has at last been pardoned for his revolt against British authority.

In the House of Commons the Under Secretary for the Colonies announced that it had been decided to permit Nana to return to Southern Nigeria and to settle at a town called America, on the Benue river.

A compassionate allowance of \$50 a month would be paid to him for two years, after which it was expected that he would be able to support himself.

Twelve years ago Nana ordered his subjects to suspend trade with British merchants. He was promptly asked to confer with the British Vice Consul on the subject, and, as he refused, warships bombarded Nana's village.

The outcome of the little war was that 500 of Nana's men were killed and Nana himself was captured with seventy-five guns. He was sent as a prisoner to Accra, where he has remained ever since.
