"I have examined the property of the North American Antimony Smelting Company, Limited, which is situated at Lake George, N. B., and I estimate there is sufficient ore opened up on three sides to keep a smelter running for twenty or thirty years with a daily capacity of one hundred tons of ore mined. And in addition thereto, there is, in my opinion, practically an inexhaustible supply of ore on the property."
