**FROM SUMMERSIDE TO TORMENTINE**

**Matters in Connection With the Route Vigorously Discussed.**

**THE SUMMERSIDE BOARD OF TRADE ACTIVE.**

**The Wants Of the People to be Presented to the Heads of the Departments.—The Board Indignant Over the Action of Some of the Local Officials. Captain Finlayson Drowned on a Voyage to South Africa.**

A SPECIAL meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade was held yesterday evening. The President, Hon. R. C. McLeod in his opening remarks announced that the object of the meeting was to further consider the matter of communication between Summerside and Cape Tormentine. He referred to the fact that the Stanley had been promised and there was no doubt but that she would be placed on the route; but in correspondence received from some sources, there was reason to fear that there might yet be a hitch. There was as yet no assurance that the Stanley would be ready at the close of navigation. He referred to a letter from Mr. A. Lord, Agent of the Marine Charlottetown, in which it was stated that owing to delay in work on the donkey boiler and the electric light gear, the Stanley would not likely be ready for the 12th or 15th of December. Some correspondence relative to mail arrangements was also satisfactory. In these questions, ignorance was shown or want of capacity to grasp the situation to work in concert with the people's wishes. The department at Ottawa should be notified and if these men could not attend to the duties devolved upon them, their positions should be filled by men capable of doing the work. In referring to the work already done by himself and other members of the Board, he said "We have accomplished a good deal, but it all can be impaired by officials who are not in sympathy with the route." Again he said "during all our intercourse with the Ministers at the heads of the departments and with Hon. Mr. Brecken, he found them unvaryingly courteous and anxious to further the best interests of the route; but I regret to say it was not so with some of the officials in Ch'town."

Mr. W. A. Brennan in speaking of the opposition in Charlottetown thought that it was no use looking for anything favorable from that source. We want to get above them and deal with the heads of the departments at Ottawa direct. He mentioned having had an interview with Mr. D. Pottinger, general Manager of the L. C. R., who convinced him that he would do all in his power to adjust train arrangements so as to serve the best interests of the country. Mr. Neil McQuarrie, also thought the arrangements should all be made through the heads of the different departments. He moved that a committee be appointed to correspond with the ministers at Ottawa with regard to repairs to the Stanley, the electric light gear which was the only cause of delay was wholly unnecessary on this route and this fact should be impressed upon the Ottawa authorities. Other speakers concurred in these opinions and the following committee was appointed to confer with the heads of the Departments:—Messrs. Wm. Stewart, R. T. Holman, Neil McQuarrie, George Godkin, W. A. Brennan.

Mr. W. A. Brennan was appointed a delegate to proceed to Ottawa to interview the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, the Minister of Railways and the Post Master General. It was also agreed to telegraph to Sackville with a view of having a delegate from that place accompany him. The meeting was largely attended and enthusiastic.

He was for many years master of the barque Katie Stewart and also of the barkentine Rolland both owned by the late Hon. John Lefurgey. He was a native of Point Prim and his wife is a daughter of the late Alex. Lefurgey of North Bedeque. Besides the bereaved widow one young daughter is left to mourn.
