Committed For Trial

The preliminary hearing of Frank Weeks of Fredericton, charged with the theft of a DeLaval Cream Separator from the Canadian National Railway was concluded before the Chief Magistrate for Queen's County Mr. D. Edgar Shaw yesterday morning, and the accused was committed for trial at the Supreme Court.

Mr. John MacInnes, consignee of the goods, and his son, Gordon H. MacInnes, gave evidence as to their receipt of three separators at Winsloe Station last June, the fourth of the order being missing. Several witnesses from Fredericton were also examined who testified as to seeing the separators in question in the possession of the accused. Conducted by George S. Ryan also gave evidence as to the delivery of four separators at Winsloe station on the 30th of June last. Constable J. W. Shaw detailed the circumstances under which the accused was arrested, as to the finding of the separators in question under search warrant, and also the statement made by the accused at the time of his arrest.

Mr. Armand Golet, of Montreal, the shipper of the DeLaval Company was also produced as a witness, and gave evidence as to the shipment of the four separators from Montreal to Mr. MacInnes at Winsloe. The accused, having been given the usual warning by the Magistrate made a statement to the effect that the machine had been left at his place by a man last July. Asked if he wished a subpoena for this prisoner the accused stated that he was not sure of his first name. He had no witnesses to offer evidence in his defence.
