WILL COL. ROOSEVELT AGAIN BE A CANDIDATE?

Theodore Roosevelt, again a conspicuous figure in the national politics of his country, has twice served as President of the United States. He was elected Vice President in 1900 and on the assassination of President McKinley in September 1901 became President by succession. He was elected to the Presidency in 1904 and served the full term. Thus he has filled nearly two full terms in the White House, but was only once elected there.

By tradition, from the days of Washington, it has come to be a recognized rule that no man shall be more than twice elected to the high office of President, the theory being that it is inexpedient, if not unsafe to grant any one man a longer term of power than eight years. Col. Roosevelt himself stands pledged never again to be a candidate for the Presidency. In the most solemn and public manner he declared in 1904 that under no conditions or circumstances would he seek or accept another election.

But, after all there is no legal or constitutional obstacle in the way of an ex-President being re-elected to succeed himself any number of times. And in republics "the will of the people is the supreme law." Doubtless Mr. Roosevelt was sincere when he declared he would never again be a candidate for the Presidency, but if the people will have it so, who is he, or what are his personal pledges, that he should thwart the popular will by refusing an office to which they desire to elect him?

His recent speaking tour through the west has been accepted by the people as an evidence that he would not refuse another nomination were it to be tendered him by the Republican National Convention. He himself has been recently silent on the subject of a third term. His personal popularity is undoubtedly very great, perhaps greater than that of any other man in the nation. It would seem that if again nominated by his party his election would be assured. Hence the temptation to accept another nomination is very great.

Henry Watterson, the veteran Democratic editor of Kentucky, is convinced that Col. Roosevelt is not only willing to accept, but is actually seeking another nomination. He writes: "Colonel Roosevelt will be a candidate for the Presidency in the next Republican National Convention. If nominated the paramount issue of the campaign will be the third term and all it implies toward growing despotism. If elected the way will be paved for 1916 so well that an election will be merely a form. By 1920 an election will not be necessary. The Colonel will have emulated Diaz."

And Diaz has been for a quarter of a century the President and Benevolent Despot of Mexico. Power and patronage have secured him many re-elections. So if in the United States a President were given a third term, the traditional safeguard would be swept away and a fourth and fifth term might follow. This danger would operate against any Presidential candidate at the polls. It seems probable therefore that Col. Roosevelt will go on to demonstrate that he could be again President if he would, drinking in liberal draughts of popular applause during the process, but in the end may decline the offered nomination. That way lies greater glory and more enduring fame than would follow an acceptance.

THE SOUTH AFRICAN ELECTIONS.

The final returns from the first general election in United South Africa show that the Nationalist party, under Premier Botha has carried 67 seats, against 37 Unionists, 4 Laborites and 13 Independents. Thus in a full House of 121 members the Nationalist party will have a clear majority of 13 over all the other parties combined.

Premier Botha was defeated in his own district, but will very easily find another seat, as he has power and patronage in his hands. Hon. Mr. Hull, another minister was also defeated by Sir George Farrar, Unionist. Premier Botha's successful opponent was Sir Percy Fitzpatrick, Dr. Jamieson, author of the Jamieson Raid and leader of the Unionist Opposition, was elected with his full ticket by large majorities in Cape Town. The Unionist party stood committed to make the new order of things as British as possible, but failed to secure a majority.

At this distance it is difficult to say whether the triumph of Premier Botha will or will not be for the best, although he stands pledged to do his utmost "to stamp out racial feeling." This sounds good and we see no reason to doubt his absolute sincerity, of which he has given many proofs since the close of the war. In any case the Opposition will be strong in men, and will be ably led and thoroughly organized from the start.

Children playing on the streets, as they are allowed to do from day to day, are exposed to great danger, and more so now during the Exhibition season when many teams are in rapid motion. They become engrossed in their play, and often dart out suddenly before a trotting team, to the great danger of limb or life. A gentleman driving out the other day informs The Guardian that only the other day a child ran suddenly before his horse, which was trotting along at a good pace, and it was only by instantly turning the horse aside that a serious accident was prevented. Parents who knowingly permit their small children to play on the streets are guilty of a great wrong and have need to be reproved for gross neglect.
