Hertz and many others. The decorations in many cases were costly and beautifully arranged. Special care was taken by hundreds of citizens to make the celebration a success.

The lights placed on the fronts of the Colonial Building and Post Office were magnificent. Messrs. Prowse Brothers with their usual enterprise gave an excellent fireworks display.

The City Council were conveyed in barouches.

As the steamer came up the harbor conveyed by the Stanley and Brant, rockets were constantly sent into the air. The floating bon fire at the end of the wharf made a beautiful effect.

The City of Ghent's whistle was in chord with the air played last night, and those who branded it horrid on other occasions were proud of it last night, as it echoed with the fire bell and the whistles and bells of factories, trains and steam boats.

The display of fireworks from the Minto and the other steamers was grand. Messrs. Duchemin's display of fireworks given from the roof of the factory added to the brilliancy of the scene on the wharf.

Hundreds thronged the balconies of the Davies and a magnificent view was obtained.

CONSPICUOUS among the many well dressed windows of places of business is that of Watson's Drug Store, which is fitted by all to have been not only among the most striking features of the celebration, but possibly the most artistic window dressing ever seen in the city. It was designed by Mr. Watson whose ideas were faithfully carried out by our well known artist, Mr. Antonio Vincent. Under an elaborate Grecian canopy of faultless architectural design, and relieved by rich draperies of crimson plush, a figure of an angel representing Victory and Peace, bears in one hand the victor's crown, in the other the palm of peace. On one side of the canopy the arms of Great Britain are wreathed with a ribbon inscribed with "Victory," while on the other side a corresponding shield displays the coat-of-arms of this province with "Peace" upon the scroll. The idea of victory is also expressed by large and handsome natural palm branches at the sides of the canopy, some of which, inverted, pay homage to the dead heroes of Charlottetown now "at peace"—Taylor and Riggs—whose names are inscribed upon a memorial tablet at the base of the setting. The canopy is surmounted by a marble bust of the Queen, and the whole work is effectively lighted by moving electric lights of various beautiful shades. Crowds of people, profuse in expression of appreciation of the appropriateness and artistic merit on the display, have thronged the sidewalk ever since the window was unveiled.

Mr. A. A. Hillson made his first shipment of chickens from his stock at Waterside poultry yards last Wednesday when he sent 110 to England via Montreal. The lot was a good one, as may be judged from the report of his agents Montreal who report them the finest lot received by them this season. Some of them weighing as light as eight pounds. Mr. Hillson has yet on hand about 500 chickens 150 of which are being fattened. He purposes wintering 200 for laying. The stock, which consists of Plymouth Rock and Wyandotte, were raised by incubators with the exception of a few imported birds. Mr. Hillson's equipment is very complete consisting of poultry house, over 100 feet in length, fitted up with all the modern improvements, a series of yards in front and rear, and incubators with a capacity of 1,200 eggs. This is the largest poultry station in the County, and Mr. Hillson's enterprise is well worthy of the encouragement it has already received.
