TATOED CHICKS ON FAIRVIEW FARM—Messrs. B. H. Currie and D. A. The system is similar to that adopted in the fox industry, each chick being tattooed with an identification mark. Up To-Date, New Cafe-Parlour Car Moncton-Tormentine

LUXURIOUSLY EQUIPPED AND AIR CONDITIONED CAR PLACED ON GULL EXPRESSES — VETERAN CONDR. JOSEPH H. DONOVAN IN CHARGE.

There has been placed in service by the Canadian National Railways on the Gull Express trains between Moncton and Tormentine yesterday, June 9th. An all-steel car named "Stewiacke," it has just come from the Point St. Charles shops, Montreal, and is air-conditioned, which affords a pleasant atmosphere for travel in all kinds of weather. It is handsomely finished in light walnut throughout, the wood being exceptionally well matched and with cream enamel ceiling makes the interior most lightesome. Sunken lights are also placed in the ceiling and give a soft, non-shadow effect. The metal fixtures are of blended light and dark chromium, while in the washrooms the most modern equipment has been installed.

The parlour-end of the car, contains nine commodious chairs, finished in a light green corded velvet and secured on a revolving base to the floor, while a rich carpet of particularly well matching colors to the car's interior finish covers the entire floor. The smoking room, located between the parlour and cafe ends of the car is roomy and the wide, comfortable settee is finished in dark leather. In the cafe end there is accommodation for 24 patrons at one sitting, four tables capable of sitting four persons on one side and four tables for two persons each; on the other, the chairs are of the latest design, being of light walnut with black leather coverings and are very comfortable. An exceptionally attractive buffet of walnut, with walnut grill work over the glass adorns the end of the dining section next to the kitchen. The latter is most up-to-date in every respect and the polished steel fixtures and finish give it an immaculate appearance. Mr. Joseph H. Donovan, one of

the most popular conductors in C.N.R. sleeping and dining car service and who has been a familiar figure to travellers on the Moncton-Saint John run of the Gull Express for many years, is in charge of the new car and is greatly elated at having so fine equipment on this route. Conductor Donovan has always been noted for the excellence of the cuisine on the cars which he has been in charge and the service he gives has always been highly complimented by all C.N.R. patrons using it.
