The Suffolks are practically a new breed in this country and are generally the winners at the Royal England show in the block test. It was a disgrace to the breed, however, to be judged in the same ring as the merino shown by an Ontario breeder, and an enterprising breeder like Mr. Lane should be given more consideration than to have his high class Suffolks placed on the same level as a snuffly lot of merinos. Leicester were entirely in the hands of Albert and S. L. Boswell, Pownal, P. E. I. These enterprising shepherds brought out some very good ones, and were of a type and so fitted that they would win their share in any company. Despite the fact that they seldom have very much competition, they always fit their sheep so that they are an object lesson at every exhibition. Albert J. and Geo. Boswell, of French Fort, P. E. I., were the only exhibitors in the Lincoln class. What has been said about the fitting of the Leicester under the management of the other Boswells, can also be applied to the Lincolns. The aged ram was a good typical animal of the breed and clipped 21 lbs. of wool; when one year old. They also showed a very fine ram lamb which weighs over 100 lbs. The flock as a whole were very uniform in type and wool and competition would be very much favored by the owners.

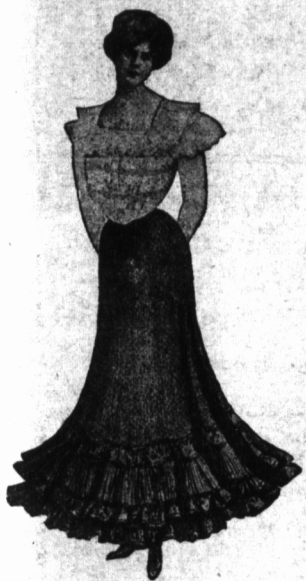

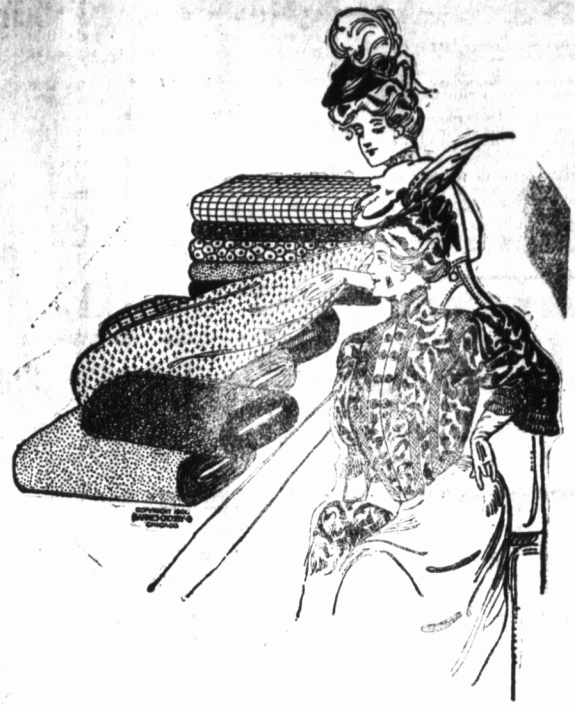

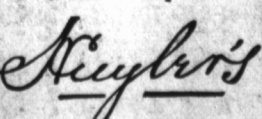
