Thomas Strangman, the pioneer carriage builder of Milton Lower Mills and one of the most prominent G. A. R. men in Dorchester, died suddenly of heart disease at his home, 8 Rosewood St., Mattapan yesterday morning, aged 80 years, after being assisted to his home by a neighbor, who found him in a fainting condition at Mattapan square. Mr. Strangman was born in Prince Edward Island, May 10, 1829. When four years old he came with his parents to New York. He is survived by a wife formerly Miss Alice French Hunt of Milton, whom he married in 1855, and a son, Walter Strangman.—Boston Herald May 25th.

The Maritime Merchant Halifax, in referring to fresh fruits and vegetables says: The principal feature of this department today is the dullness of the potato market, under which there has been a slight decline in price. The Upper Canadian markets are also dull. This, however, is in contrast to conditions further west, where a Prince Edward Island shipment recently sold 10 carloads at a price higher than that prevailing locally. Lemons are arriving in poor condition, and jobbers have to re-pack them. Consequently, the price is quite firm. Strawberries are getting lower in price, supplies still coming from the States in fair quantities.

During the unavoidable absence of Rev. George Orman, Vernon River the services will be conducted as follows:—Sunday, June 13th Rev. Wm. Harrison, chairman of the District, will preach at Vernon River and Cherry Valley.
