PARIS, June 28.—By the action of the French senate committee, which has recommended opening the question again of the immense meat contracts which the French government was about to conclude with American firms, Canadian packers will have a chance to bid for a million head of cattle to be delivered at French ports within the next two years. Reports have it that it had been practically decided to give this contract to a large Chicago firm of packers.
