New World Pope Not Impossible Despite Custom

By A.E. STUNTZ, Associated Press Staff Writer VATICAN CITY, Jan. 24—Since the moment Pope Pius XI himself became reconciled to death, prelates and laymen alike have been pondering the selection of his successor.

Italians are confident a custom of more than 400 years will not be broken when the Sacred College of Cardinals meets under the chairmanship of Cardinal Piacelli, papal secretary of state. They are sure one of their cardinals will reign.

Four United States cardinals, a Canadian, a Brazilian and an Argentine, will take part in the electoral conclave. They are Cardinals Hayes of New York, Dougherty of Philadelphia, O'Connell of Boston, Mundelein of Chicago, Villeneuve of Quebec, Leme da Silveira Cintra of Rio de Janeiro and Capello of Argentina.

Their very presence at the conclave was made possible by Pius XI. He extended the period between the death of a pope and the start of the conclave to three weeks. He was prompted to do so by the dis-appointment of Cardinal O'Connell, who sped from Boston to Rome at the death of Pope Benedict XV in 1922, but arrived too late to vote.
