Jones Ranks As Ace On Defense Of Walker Trophy
NEW YORK, May 11.—Twice winner of the Amateur title and a player whose scaring achievements in the last six years of the American open place him in a class by himself, Bobby Jones ranks as the ace of the American team which will defend the Walker Cup, international golfing trophy, over the famous St. Andrew's course of Scotland.
At twenty-four years, this stocky Georgia veteran is the possessor of a medal record unparalleled in American golf. Only once has he required more than 300 strokes to make his four 18-hole rounds in the last six U. S. open tournaments. The records give him a remarkable average only slightly in excess of seventy-four strokes a round. Twice previously he has represented America in Walker Cup competitions, defeating Roger Wethered in 1922 and winning over Macfarlane, C. Hezlet in the matches of 1924.
Jones' links feats date back to early boyhood. After winning a special children's tournament in 1910 he steadily climbed the bunkers to national fame, reaching the finals of the Amateur championship in 1919, when he defeated Davy Herron, 5 and 4, after eliminating Jim Manion, Bob Gardner, Rury Knipper and W. C. Fownes.
From that time on Jones became an annual and outstanding contender for both the amateur and open championships. He won the amateur event in 1924 and 1925 after capturing the open crown in 1923, when he outstroked Bobby Cruickshank, professional star, in the play-off of a tie at 296.
Jones' defeat by Willie Macfarlane, after they had tied for the open crown last year at Worcester, Mass., frustrated the Atlanta player's attempt to win American golf's two most coveted honors in the same year. But the future marvel, despite his recent overwhelming defeat in a special 72-hole match at the hands of the professional star, Walter Hagan, on two Florida courses.

Quimet Beyond Peak Of Career But Still Ranks
NEW YORK, May 11.—Francis Quimet of Boston, who rose to golfing fame thirteen years ago by defeating the famous British professional, Harry Vardon and Ted Ray, in a play-off for the open championship, is the second oldest member of the American team which will defend the international Walker Cup against Great Britain on the St. Andrew's links of Scotland, June 2 and 3.
Recent campaigns indicate that the thirty-three-year-old amateur of 1913—the first simon-pure to annex the open championship—has passed the peak of his career. But Quimet still ranks among America's foremost players despite his failure to qualify last year at Oakmont after the amateur championship field had been reduced for the first time to sixteen contestants.
A year after his memorable battle against Ray and Vardon, Quimet came through to mount the amateur throne, while in 1920 he was runner-up to Chick Evans for the title. Since then he has been a consistently brilliant performer, falling to the Bobby Jones and Willie Macfarlane for the national open crown last year only after he had lost three strokes on the first hole when his ball struck a tree.
Quimet, a strong match player who never can be counted out without a plucky fight, has been one of the game's most popular figures having been beaten in three previous Walker Cup singles contests, although he finished all square with Roger Wethered in a match in 1923.
In the course of his long and brilliant career, many other titles crown a half dozen times and won such outstanding events as the Western amateur and North and South championships. He captured the historic St. George's vase the last time the U. S. Walker Cup team went abroad.

Kansas Mentor Has Coached Seventeen Basket Champs
LAWRENCE, Kan., May 11.—Dr. F. C. Allen director of physical education at the University of Kansas, has coached seventeen basketball quintets to championships in the last nineteen seasons. Originator of the five man zone defense, the Kansas coach has developed undisputed basketball champions of the Missouri Valley for four consecutive seasons, and five years ago his team tied for first place in the Valley.
Under the zone system each player has one of fourteen feet to guard. If an opposing player breaks through the defense, the nearest guard covers him while a forward occupies the vacant guard position. His offensive game consists of short passes, pivots and accurate short shots. The Kansas coach usually keeps the largest squad in the Valley at work throughout the season.
