All Races are Stakes, and Entries Close July, 5th.

The following are the classes and conditions governing same.

- 2.17 Straight Trot Purse \$300.00
- 2.30 Straight Trot Purse \$300.00
- 2.25 Straight Pace Purse \$300.00

Stakes guaranteed for amounts stated, should payments exceed the value of stake, excess will be added to guaranteed amount.

Entries close Saturday July 5th, 1919. Horses must be eligible on that date.

Entry fee of 5 per cent in all stakes, payable as follows—one per cent Saturday July 5th. Two per cent Wednesday July 30th. Two per cent Wednesday August 20th when horses must be named. Five per cent additional from all money winners.

All races mile heats, best three in five to harness, and to finish at the end of the fifth heat, when money will be awarded according to standing in summaries.

Any horse distancing the field, or any part thereof entitled to one money only. Stakes, divided, 50 per cent to first, 25 per cent to second, 15 per cent to third, 10 per cent to fourth.

Right reserved to declare off any stake at any time by refunding the amount paid in, to change order of programme, to reject any entry, or bar any driver.

If owing to bad weather, or other unforeseen circumstances, the Trotting Park shall not be able to start all, or any of the above stakes, on the date advertised, such race, or races, may be declared off.

This meeting will be governed by the National Trotting Association Rules, except where they conflict with the above conditions. MAIL YOUR ENTRIES EARLY.
