AMENDMENTS TO THE ROAD ACT.

(Continued from First Page.) bill to amend an act relating to survey and medicine was of a private nature and that a fee be charged.

It was set down for second reading tomorrow.

The House resolved itself into committee of the whole with H. Dr. Douglas in the chair on second reading of the bill to amend the Public Roads Act, and an act in amendment thereof.

The House was still in committee when the Speaker took the chair at one o'clock.

AFTERNOON SESSION. House met at 5 p. m.

House resumed committee of the whole on the Act to amend the Road Act 1901 and an act in amendment thereof.

On the third clause to raise the price of the road makers from \$1.50 to \$2 Mr. Currie and Mr. Arsenault contended that \$1.50 was sufficient. Mr. Smith, Mr. Read, Mr. Simpson, Hon. Mr. Peters, Hon. Mr. Wheel, Hon. Mr. Cumiskey maintained that the work done by the road machine men was worth fully \$2 a day.

The bill was reported agreed to with an amendment and set down for third reading tomorrow.

HON. MR. WHEAR introduced a bill to be intitled "An Act authorizing Corporations incorporated by the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada to lend and invest moneys in the Province of Prince Edward Island and to authorize the investments of Trust Funds in certain Loan Companies."

The bill was read a first time and set down for second reading tomorrow.

House adjourned till 10 a. m.

THE adjourned meeting of the shippers Association was held at the Davies yesterday at one o'clock. President Brown was in the chair. The petition to the Dominion Government to reimburse the losses suffered by the shippers of perishable goods—about \$8000—was taken up. It was adopted by the Association and a delegation consisting of Gen. Brown New Glasgow, William Sellar, Charlottetown and D. A. Wedlock, Stanley Bridge, appointed to wait on the Local Government and have them forward the petition Ottawa. A resolution was passed that the winter boats be put under control. This was also submitted to the Government. A committee composed of John Wheatley and William Sellar were appointed to correspond with the Elder Deans' line with a view to having a steamship call about May 1st for a cargo of cattle for Liverpool. The Association agreed to furnish 400 cattle and the Dominion Government will be asked to pay the same subsidy as was paid the Manchester line, who, it is understood, will not send a boat here this spring. It was pointed out that unless we have a boat here in the spring a great loss will result to many shippers.
