Of the Lawrence Eagle
Tells of His

TRIP TO P. E. ISLAND
"A Delightful Haven of Rest"
—As Other People See
Us at Home.

Prince Edward Island is a delightful
haven of rest for vacationists who desire
an entire change and enjoy a stay in a
peaceful, hospitable and religious
community.

My attention was first attracted to a
trip to the island by the beautiful illus-
trated circulars of the Plant Line, de-
scribing ideal routes between the Uni-
ted States and the maritime provinces,
and I finally concluded to go to Charlott-
etown, P. E. I. I selected the steamer,
La Grande Duchesse, and secured a
stateroom on the pilot house deck by
good luck, through the efforts of Agent
Dowling at the wharf office, 20 Atlantic
avenue, Agent J. A. Flanders having
disposed of his quota.

My travelling companion and myself
sailed Saturday, Aug 11, from Boston,
with the temperature above 100 in the
sun. There were nearly 800 passengers
aboard, besides a crew of 140. The
steamer is a strictly up-to-date boat, with
an electric light, telephone, etc.; and was
built at Newport News, Va. in 1896.
She is 5000 tons, with twin screws, and
at forced speed can make 20 knots.
Our reverie was disturbed by the
bugle call announcing supper. The dining
room is a beauty and the food would
satisfy the most fastidious. After the
meal and a walk of several times around
the promenade deck to the distance of
about a mile we again find our chairs
and remain there, being comfortable
without wraps until 9.30, when we re-
tired, and nothing disturbed us until 4
the next morning. At the hour we were
awakened by the sailors washing the
decks. We arose at 4.30 to see a beautiful
sunrise. The glass registered 53 and we
pressed our coats into service. Although
there was a little roll on the sea it did
not affect us in the least.

When we left the dock and everybody
was on deck it seemed as though the
boat would be crowded and it excited
our curiosity to know where the great
bulk of passengers kept themselves. The
only one on board whom we knew was
Charles W. Hatch, a former resident of
Lawrence, and at one time in the ice
business here, being a member of the
firm of Hatch & Co.

He was accompanied by Frank Morse,
a travelling salesman, well known to
many local business men, also
J. A. Henghan, with C. E.
Foster, produce dealers, Charlot-
teton, who went to Hawkesbury.
We reached Halifax at 4 o'clock Sun-

day afternoon and after looking about
concluded to go to one of the hotels for
supper. As we walked down the gang
plank I heard my name called out and
soon was shaking hands with a man
whom I did not know, but proved to be
Mr. Duncan, a conductor on the Inter-
colonial railroad, which position he has
held for 44 years. It appeared that re-
latives of his who reside near us notified
him we were coming and he had come to
meet us. After a drive through the park
system and past many points of interest,
including the citadel and public gardens
and various institutions, we dined with
Mr. Duncan and his family at his pret-
ty home and after another interesting
drive were landed at the wharf about
10 o'clock.

The steamer sailed at midnight, and
after another refreshing night's sleep
with the glass about 48 degrees we
awoke Monday morning, and from that
time on were practically in sight of land
until our arrival at Charlottetown. We
left several hundred passengers at Hal-
ifax, N. S. and at Hawkesbury
C. B., about 200 more landed. The
scenery all the way simply beautiful.
At Hawkesbury we were unable to land
on account of the channels being occu-
pied by a government boat at anchor, and
passengers and baggage were taken off
by a small barge. We lost a little time
there, but that was made up and the
trip continued through the
Strait of Canso, where one would think
it was impossible for a steamer of 5000
tons to pass. The scenery, with its
quaint farmhouses and green fields and
but little life apparent, was restful, in-
deed. The moon was somewhat obs-
cured and there was quite a breeze, but
we sped through Northumberland strait
and arrived at our destination, Charlot-
teton, P. E. I., at midnight, but re-
mained on the boat overnight.

The next morning (Tuesday) we went
ashore during a shower and at once
made our way to the Queen hotel, pre-
sided over by Mrs. P. P. Archibald.
Here we met C. C. Campbell, a live stock
dealer of Dutton, Ontario, and his con-
sultant, Lawrence which caused us to inves-
tigate, as we supposed it was someone
from home, but she proved to be from
Lawrence, Ontario. However, they ac-
companied us on many of our trips and
the time passed away very quickly.

During the morning I spent the time
in visiting the newspaper offices, where
I was well received. The three dailies
include the Morning Guardian, which is
edited by Mr. McCreedy, a well infor-
med gentleman, and two evening papers,
the Examiner and Patriot. The for-
mer is edited by Mr. Cotton and the latter
by Mr. Nash. There are also a number
of weeklies, the proprietors of which
were very kind to me.

Charlottetown has a population of
13,000 and has at present 40 liquor
saloons. The license fee is \$200 per
year. There is very little intoxication
and 'tis expected that in a short time
the town will be under prohibition rule.
The great days of the week are Tuesdays
and Fridays, which are market days,
and the farmers, for this is a great agri-
cultural centre, bring in their products
of meats, berries, vegetables, butter, etc.,
and offer them for sale at what seems to
us a strikingly low price. They occupy
a large wooden building near Queen
Square. On the evening of market days
there is always a band concert in the
Square.

Making our headquarters here it af-
forded us an excellent opportunity for
side trips. Wednesday morning we vi-
sited the Kensington rifle range, where a
provincial shoot was being held. In the
afternoon we ferried over to Rocky Pt.
to visit the Indians, and ran into a Sal-
vation Army picnic. Thursday after-
noon we enjoyed an outing by steamer
to Orwell, a 23-mile ride. The red cliffs
with the mantle of green and the blue
ocean made a beautiful combination of
color. We met many Ch'town people
on this trip, who impressed us very fa-
vorably.

On the return home nearly everyone
aboard was seasick, including myself.
We preceded the steamer Halifax up the
harbor, and were interested in the work-
ing of the searchlight. Friday we vi-
sited the provincial building and were re-
ceived kindly by the provincial auditor
and Miss Smith, stenographer in the
legislative library, who presented us
with several souvenirs. The afternoon
we spent at the market. Saturday we
strolled through Victoria park, which is
beautiful in its naturalness with its drive
along the shore.

There was but little to do Sunday ex-
cept to go to church. Everything includ-
ing the railroad, is at a standstill. Mon-
day we drove in a barouche to the Cliff
house, on the Gulf of St. Lawrence. The
railroad is a little antiquated and slow.
The first day we saw the funeral of the
chief of the fire department. It is a cus-
tom that no women attend a funeral
not even of her own husband. The cas-
ket was on a Concord wagon banked with
flowers and drawn by associates and
followed by members of organizations
with which deceased was connected.
At the hotel I ran across D. W. Morrisey,
of Seattle, Wash., a neighbor of
David Bruce, son of ex-Mayor A. B.
Bruce who is spending the summer with
his family on the island, also met a Mr.
Gray, a buyer of lobsters for an English
firm, and Mr. Patton a Halifax insurance
man.

We began the return trip on the
steamer Duchesse last Wednesday at
9 a. m. and enjoyed a pleasant sail with
stops at Hawkesbury and Halifax.
While at the latter place we met Rev.

J. H. Parsley and family, taking in the
sights. Mr. Parsley, it will be remem-
bered, was formerly with the First Bap-
tist church of this city and is now locat-
ed at Moncton, N. B. He was attend-
ing a Baptist convention at Halifax.
The steamer left Halifax at 3 p. m. on
Thursday, and arrived in Boston Friday
at 5.15 p. m., and thus was brought to
a close one of the most pleasant and rest-
ful vacations.

An interesting feature of the journey
is the visit to the steamer of the custom
house officers and the examination of
the baggage of the passengers. Many a
readable yarn might be told of the
various subterfuges resorted to by these
passengers in an effort to "smuggle"
some dutiable article across the border,
and it need not be said that these schemes
are oftentimes successful. But this article
is already too long, and I must reserve
this for some future time. R.

The funeral service was conducted by the
Rev. John Goodwill, whose kind and im-
pressive remarks, were most suitable to
the occasion. She leaves a sorrowing hus-
band to mourn, also her parents, Mr.
and Mrs. Hector McKay, of DeSable, to-
gether with four sisters and four brothers.

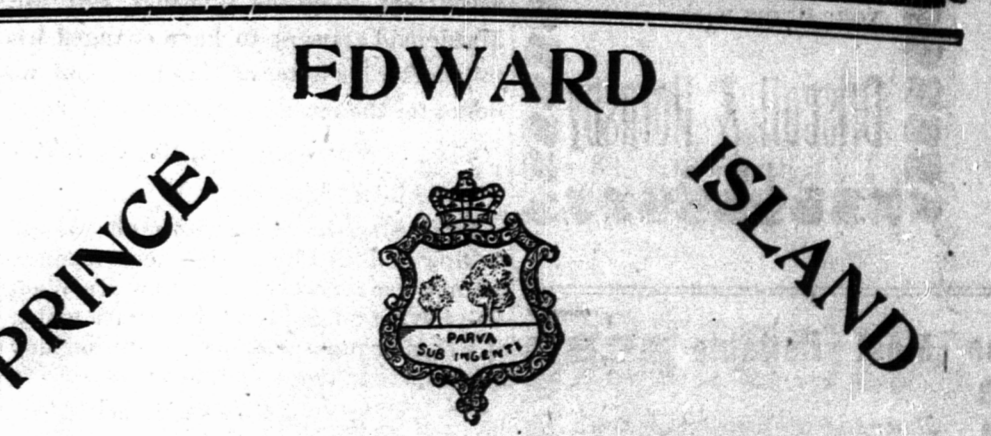
