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Conservative Cyclone Hits Pownal

Bennett Gives His Answer To Premier King

Old Age Pensions for Every Province In Canada, Paid Out Of The Federal Treasury, Says Conservative Chieftain—A Vicious Principle, Says Premier King.

YARMOUTH, N. S., July 2—Carrying his campaign into Nova Scotia, Hon. R. B. Bennett addressed large rallies at Digby and at a later hour here tonight. Old Age Pensions and the Duncan Report on Maritime rights engaged the chief attention of the Conservative Leader at both meetings.

"If the Conservative Government succeeds on July 28 and I have every reason to believe it will," Mr. Bennett exclaimed, "I will see to it that Old Age Pensions are paid to every Province of the Dominion from the Federal Treasury." That is my answer to a Prime Minister who is not concerned with the importation into Canada of Russian coal and New Zealand butter; that is my answer to a Prime Minister who says the payment of money to the provinces in Old Age Pensions is a vicious principle. It is a national obligation. Premier King says it cannot be done constitutionally. If the Dominion can pay fifty percent of Old Age Pensions, why cannot it pay 99 percent?

Tonight Mr. Bennett spoke in the interests of Mayor J. M. Walker, who is opposing the Minister of National Defence, Hon. J. L. Ralston, in Yarmouth-Sheburne. At Digby earlier he supported H. B. Short, who has

GARAGE BURNED AT KENSINGTON

Central Garage Belonging to Mr. Ray Sudsbury Totally Destroyed Tuesday Night.

The Central Garage, owned and operated by Mr. Ray Sudsbury, Kensington, went up in flames Tuesday night, July 1. The fire was discovered by Mr. Sudsbury who, when he turned off the light in the office, discovered fire in the office and main building. The alarm was immediately given, and all available fire fighting apparatus was at once on the scene. Every effort was put forward to save the building, but without avail. A strong wind was blowing, but carrying the flames away from the adjoining buildings. From the time the first alarm was given, until the whole structure was in embers only twenty-five minutes had passed. Agents who had done business with Mr. Sudsbury have said that he had one of the best equipped garages in the Maritimes. It is the intention of Mr. Sudsbury to replace the plant as soon as possible. In the meantime he will continue to handle gasoline and oils. The sympathy of the whole community goes out to Mr. Sudsbury in his loss. The building destroyed was partly covered by insurance.

Myers Hits From Shoulder Smashing Blows At Pownal

Scathing Indictment Of Opponents' Tactics And Arguments By Conservative Candidate Rouses Audience to Enthusiastic Cheers And Applause. Former Stronghold of Liberalism Tenders Great Ovation To Messrs. Myers And McLure At Largely Attended Meeting Last Night.

"It ill behoves any man who has had his salary and his living handed to him in a monthly pay envelope to make sneering remarks about men of another political party who worked their way by hard labor to positions of captains of industry in this country," said Hon. John H. Myers, at Pownal hall last night in a smashing counter-attack on references by Hon. Cyrus Macmillan, newly appointed Minister of Fisheries, to an alleged "Millionaire row" and "swollen monopolists" in the Conservative ranks. The Conservative candidate's vigorous repudiation of his opponent's tactics of insinuation and abuse came in the closing ten minutes of the meeting and created a storm of enthusiasm and applause, in which adherents of both parties joined until the cheering and handclapping was almost deafening.

"Hon. Mr. Macmillan told you something else tonight which he never told at any meeting in this campaign," Mr. Myers continued. He said we asked New Zealand to send in her butter to this country: Did you ever hear the like of that? Are you farmers of Pownal going to swallow it? (Applause and cries of No!) "And he talked about the Conservative party letting in oleomargarine: Does he think you are green? Does he see any cabbage in your hair? Doesn't he know that during the hectic days of the war oleomargarine was allowed into Canada as a war measure and that it was never allowed since? (Applause).

Another Bluff Called

"He talked about subsidy settlement," Mr. Myers continued, answering categorically the statements advanced by the Fisheries Minister in his preceding speech. "He told you, in effect: 'Just send me to Ottawa, and I will get it! I got the Duncan report for you and the interim subsidy of \$125,000? Well, what is an 'interim'? How long is it going to last? He tells us to wait until the Audit Board makes this final adjustment, and then the aged poor of the Province will get their pensions, then the teachers will get a little more, then we will be able to finance our highway projects, and so on. I will tell you what, when Hon. R. B. Bennett comes into power we will get not only justice with regard to Old Age Pensions, teachers' salaries, soldiers' pensions, federal assistance to highways and agriculture, but we will get our subsidy settlement as well, and it will not be held over for four years to be dangled as bait for another election campaign. (Applause).

THE SUBSIDY QUESTION

ONE OF THE MAIN ISSUES OF THE PRESENT FEDERAL ELECTION ACCORDING TO PREMIER MACKENZIE KING IS THE RECORD OF THE GOVERNMENT. HERE, IN CHRONOLOGICAL ORDER, IS THE RECORD OF BOTH GOVERNMENTS, FEDERAL AND PROVINCIAL, IN THE MATTER OF OUR CLAIMS FOR INCREASED SUBSIDY. LET THE ELECTORS JUDGE WHETHER THIS RECORD CAN BE RECONCILED WITH TRUTH AND SINCERITY, OR EVEN WITH COMMON SENSE:

The report of the Duncan Commission, recommending in addition to interim payments, "IMMEDIATE CONSIDERATION" OF THE WHOLE SUBJECT OF MARITIME SUBSIDY CLAIMS WITH A VIEW TO COMPLETE REVISION OF THE FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS AS BETWEEN THESE PROVINCES AND THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT, was submitted to the Mackenzie King Government in September, 1926. The interim payments were voted by Parliament in the following year:

In August, 1927, the Saunders Government took office in this Province. In November of the same year a Dominion-Province conference was held at Ottawa, at which the question of readjustment of provincial subsidies was discussed and favorable opinions expressed as to Prince Edward Island's right to a substantial increase.
