Grain Values Crumble In Chicago

(Associated Press) CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Grain values crumbled late today, influenced by sympathy with cotton market weakness and because of increased hedging sales of wheat at Winnipeg. A rally however, ensued just at the finish, and left the market a trifle above yesterday.

Late declines of grains took place notwithstanding an earlier advance that accompanied reports President Roosevelt and economic advisers were to discuss the commodity dollar. The volume of grain trading was somewhat larger than yesterday, and until near the close the prevailing sentiment was notably less pessimistic.

Wheat closed nervous, 1-4 off to 3-8 up compared with yesterday's finish, corn unchanged to 7-8 down oats at 1-4 decline to 3-8 advance, and provisions showing 7 to 20 cents setback, or longer where necessary.
