The Princess arrived from Point du Chene yesterday evening at 6.15 with a full cargo of mixed freight and almost twenty passengers. The mails will be transferred to this route today, the steamer leaving on the arrival of the morning train from Charlottetown.

The opening of Summer street has about reached an awkward stage. P. T. Fanning having declined the offer made by the Town Council for his property now protests against any interference of the stone foundation on the west side of the corner of the old Campbell Hotel building adjoining his own.

Mr. Fanning now claims the ownership of a strip 5 ft wide by 200 ft long of the street site purchased by the town from J. A. Brace. Mr. Brace bought this property with the rest of the James McLeod estate between Water and Alley streets from the Chancery Court, but Mr. Fanning claims to have bought this strip with the property now occupied by him from R. Mc C. Staver. It is understood that Mr. Staver holds the deed to 20x200 ft. and claims to have sold only 15x200 ft. to Mr. Fanning, the other 5 ft being occupied. Interested therefore in this strip of 5x200 ft are the town, Mr. Fanning, Mr. Brace, the Chancery Court, and some even think that this strip rightly belongs to the old Green estate, the original owners. Mr. Fanning yesterday fenced off five ft of the property from the north end of his building back to Alley St. It is probable that at the special meeting of the Town Council this evening the first one of the arbitrators will be appointed.

FELL OFF TRAIN AFTER LEAVING MONCTON

Danish Immigrant was Missed at Petitcodiac—Cannot Speak a Word of English.

St. JOHN, April 25.—When the immigrant train carrying the steerage passengers of the str. Tugislan, arrived in the depot Saturday at noon from Halifax, it was learned that a Danish immigrant by the name of Jannsen was missing, and it was feared that he had fallen off the train and had been killed. Fellow passengers said he had first been missed when the train was in the vicinity of Petitcodiac. A search was at once made, but could not be found. It was said by some that he had been seen aboard the train when at Moncton, so it is presumable that he

fell off somewhere between these two places, Moncton and Petitcodiac. His luggage, what there was of it, was on the train; his papers and pocketbook he had on his person, though the latter did not contain anything in the shape of money; so that hatless, moneyless and doubtless with torn clothing, supposing he survived his fall, he would be mistaken for a tramp's treatment at the hands of people to whom he might appeal. Added to this is the fact that he cannot speak a word of English, and it will be a difficult job for him to explain his identity.

EVAN ROBERTS WENT INTO A FRENZY

Welsh Exhorter Caused a Scene at a Revival Meeting by Declaring That Someone was Trying to Hypnotize Him.

LONDON, April 25.—The Daily Mail publishes the following:—In the Sun Hall, Liverpool, Evan Roberts faced an audience of seven or eight thousand people and made an extraordinary demonstration. "There is an English friend in this audience who has come to hypnotize me," he exclaimed. "Will you leave this building at once, or else the Lord forgive you! He has come to play with the sacred things of God," he went on passionately, "yet God can sweep him like chaff before the wind."

This Evan Roberts declined to do, and the minister, the Rev. O. L. Roberts, insisted on the evange list being explicit and mentioning the offender for the reputation of the clergy. He himself was a minister of many years standing, and he demanded that the name should be given. "Oh, brother, brother, don't!" replied Mr. Roberts. "But the accusation has been made and I insist," replied the minister. Thereupon Evan Roberts, accompanied by his sister and Miss Davies, turned round and left the platform, amid cries of "Shame!" from the audience. The meeting broke up in confusion.

Mr. Roberts complained that some member of the audience objected to the trouble this constant exercise caused, and demanded that man to pray for forgiveness. "Now," Roberts burst out, "don't be surprised if your arm withers by your side." There was another pause, and a voice in the gallery suggested that perhaps the offender was an Englishman. "He is not English, but Welsh," replied Roberts; "he is not a church member, but a deacon; he is not a preacher, but a preacher, he is not a preacher, but a minister of the Gospel. I should not be surprised to see him on this platform; in fact he is on this platform."
