Yesterday morning one hundred and fifty of the members of the officers and crew of H.M.C.S. Niobe paraded to church and attended services in St. Peter's and St. Dunstan's Cathedrals where special sermons were delivered. The contingent was in command of Gunnery Officer Lieut. Street and was headed by the ship's band. They presented a very pretty scene on parade.

At St. Dunstan's Cathedral yesterday Rev. Louis McTory, a son of Francis McTory, for the first time was the celebrant at High Mass. The sermon for the occasion was eloquently delivered by Rev. J. F. Johnson, Sturgeon, who came to the city for that purpose. Rev. Father McTory will take up work in the Diocese of Minnesota and will leave for St. Paul very shortly.

Colonel Humphrey, A. G. G., in charge of administration 6th division, leaves this morning for Sussex, N.B., for the purpose of taking command of the two camps commencing June 20th and July 4th respectively. The troops training at the Sussex camp this year will include all units from New Brunswick, No. 1 Field Ambulance from Charlottetown, P. E. I.—Halifax Herald.

A runaway occurred on Saturday evening on Great George St. In front of J. G. Carver's restaurant a wheel of a carriage, containing a family party out for a pleasure drive, broke down and threw the occupants out, a little girl being somewhat bruised and shaken up as a result. The horse became frightened and ran at a very lively clip out Great George Street to Euston where he was captured. The carriage was considerably damaged.

The funeral of the late Miss Lillian M. Doyle, daughter of Peter J. Doyle, steward of the Charlottetown Club, city, and whose death took place on Friday morning at the age of thirteen years, was held yesterday afternoon at 2.45. Services at St. Dunstan's Cathedral was conducted by Rev. Father McIntyre of St. Dunstan's College. The following were the pallbearers—Wilfrid Maddigan, James Vickers, Willie Burns, Fred Kenney, Earl McDonald and Joseph Doyle.

A very sudden death occurred on board H.M.C.S. Niobe on Saturday morning when William Hayward, a leading stoker, was suddenly taken ill. He expired shortly after being taken to the hospital ward, heart-failure being the cause. The deceased was a member of the Church of England, a native of Pembroke, England, had joined the Niobe several years ago and was thirty-four years of age. His funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon. The body will be removed privately from G. D. Wright's Undertaking Parlors to St. Peter's Cathedral where a naval funeral service will be held, Canon Simpson officiating. The body will be conveyed to the grave on a gun carriage and the firing party, who will fire three rounds at the grave, and a large number of members of the ship's crew in charge of Lieut. Street, will attend as mourners.

The splendid photograph, enlarged, of the late Honorable A. I. McKenzie, is on exhibition in the show window of J. H. Bell's boot and shoe store, Great George Street. This picture will be presented by Boyne Loyal Orange Lodge of this city to the Prince Edward Island Hospital, where it will be hung in a conspicuous place in one of the wards. The late Mr. McKenzie as the older citizens will remember was a trustee of that hospital from its inception in 1884, until up to the time of his demise in 1901, a period of seventeen years. It is also worthy of note that on this important board Mr. McKenzie particularly represented the Orangemen's Association of this city. He always evinced a keen interest in the success of the Prince Edward Island Hospital and in seasons out and out of season, was one of its strongest and most persistent workers and advocates. The success that has attended the institution and operation of this worthy hospital is in a large measure due to the noble efforts of certain prominent doctors and laymen, who are now numbered with the past. This portrait is a fitting memorial to the late Mr. McKenzie and is indeed a fitting tribute from his brother Orangemen in this city.

The flag has been flying over the Sons of England Hall in this city at half mast for the last two days and today. This is in respect to the memory of a brave Englishman who died Saturday morning on H.M.C.S. Niobe. A good many years ago a midshipman off a British ship visiting here died and his grave has since then been decorated annually by the S. O. E.

At the service in St. Peter's Cathedral last evening Mr. Birmingham, Secretary of the Canadian Brotherhood of St. Andrew, delivered an address touching on the work of that society in Canada. He also addressed a meeting to men only in the Cathedral in the afternoon on the same topic. In this he made a feature of the value of individual effort in the great work of helping one's fellow man to turn his mind towards things eternal. Rev. W. A. Cotton also delivered a brief address touching upon the great benefit deriving from the attitude of humility.

They all declare that the captain was covered in blood. It is inconceivable for them to imagine a motive for the brutal attack upon him. The whole story is a mystifying sea tragedy, yet the trained mind of the medical examiner and the police who are working upon the case have discovered a chain of circumstances and some material evidence which has given them an idea of the solution of the mystery. One act easy for the police to learn is that the three members of the crew had exclusive opportunity to commit this horrible crime. It is not established that all three are implicated, and there is evidence which has caused the police to give most of their attention to one member of the crew in making their investigation.

The church was filled from many of those attending coming from quite a distance in the country to be present. At the evening service a ministerial student, M. C. McKinnon, Canoe Cove, officiated and preached acceptably to a large congregation.

The service closed with the responsive singing of the Coronation ode to the tune of the Old Hundred. This was rendered with splendid effect.

Citizens, to the numbers in the hundreds, availed themselves of their first opportunity to visit H.M.C.S. Niobe yesterday when the ship was free to inspection. During the afternoon the water between the Marine wharf and the big ship was continually dotted with rowboats carrying people to and fro and a very animated scene was presented. The wharf itself was filled the entire afternoon. As for the ship, she was the object of the greatest interest and of the hundreds who were on board none declared other than the greatest pleasure on their visit. Many vessels of His Majesty's Navy have visited in this port but very few obtained a reputation for the kindness and hospitality of its officers and crew like those of the Niobe. All were most courteous and obliging and in showing visitors over the big ship exhibited a keen desire to explain everything that might prove of interest to them. The crew did not seem to be the least perturbed by the numbers of strangers on board—explaining that they had become thoroughly accustomed to that sort of thing in Halifax and later in Quebec. They went on with their occupation, whether it was washing up or eating, with an equal nonchalance. Both officers and crew of the Niobe will undoubtedly prove welcome visitors to this port in the years to come and as Canada's Navy Flagship interest in her will not wane.
