Fertilizers For Potatoes

In the growing of potatoes on farms where stable manure is not plentiful commercial fertilizers of proper mixtures may be used with advantage. To demonstrate the value of commercial fertilizers when used singly and with manure potato fields on a number of the illustration stations operated by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa were treated in different ways, side by side, with a section receiving 20 tons of farmyard manure to the acre. Other plots of similar land were treated with 10 tons of the manure, and 750 pounds of the fertilizer, and a third plot with 1500 pounds of chemical fertilizer and a fourth plot was left unfertilized. The fertilizer used was one made up of four parts each of nitrogen and potash, and eight parts of phosphoric acid.

These demonstrations were carried on for three years at eleven stations in Nova Scotia. The three-year average yields were, from the farmyard manure plot 196 bushels to the acre, from the plots receiving manure and fertilizer 234 bushels to the acre. The plots receiving only the commercial fertilizer yielded 225 bushels to the acre, while the unfertilized plots gave less than 100 bushels.

From these tests it was shown that the greatest gains were obtained on the plots where both manure and chemical fertilizers were used. To arrive at the value of these fertilizers it was calculated that 55 p. c. of the cost of the fertilizer was charged to the potato crop and 45 p. c. to succeeding crops. On this basis it was found that the increased yield cost \$9.73 per acre or on a bushel basis less than 8 cents.

Commenting on this demonstration Mr. J. C. Maynard chief supervisor of the illustration stations says in his report for 1928 that under practical farm conditions it would appear that soils low in fertility can be restored to a profitable basis by the limited use of a chemical fertilizer to supplement the necessary amount of plant food which cannot be supplied by farmyard manure. Winter Shipping

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 19.—One ship of the Canadian National fleet laden with freight came into port yesterday from Buenos Aires, while another sails today with general cargo for Bermuda, Porto Rico, St. Kitts and other islands of the West Indies. This is a typical report on the movements of this fleet that operates out of Halifax in the winter time to far distant ports. The boat from South America was the Canadian Traveller. The ship

that departs today southward bound is the Champlain. Tomorrow the Canadian Pathfinder will sail from Halifax for Santos, Brazil, Montevideo, Uruguay and Buenos Aires, Argentine Republic. The ship has a few crew with Captain R. Forbes, a Nova Scotian in command, and Captain Marshall, another Buenos Aires chief officer. The ship will carry a full general cargo. The Canadian National liner Lady Somers will sail from Halifax on Saturday night for Bermuda the Bahamas and Jamaica with passengers, mail and cargo.
