Livestock

MONTREAL, June 7 — Steady prices, with a slight rise on some cattle, prevailed on Montreal livestock markets today. There were no early sales of hogs. Receipts: Cattle, 407; calves, 128; sheep and lambs, 339; hogs, 945.

3000 steers sold at \$8 to \$8.50 with a part load up to \$8.75. Mediums made from \$6.75 to \$8 and commons up to \$6.50. Light steers were down to \$4.50 with heifers ranging from \$4 to \$7.50. Good cows were \$5.50 to \$6.25 with a top of \$6.50, mediums, \$4.75 to \$5.50 and commons up to \$4.50. Canners and cutters made \$2 to \$3.25, common bulls \$3.50 to \$4.75, butchers \$5 to \$5.50.

A few good vealers made \$7.25 to \$7.50 and mediums \$6.50 to \$7. Fair to medium vealers sold from \$5.50 to \$6 and commons \$5 to \$5.25. Common drinkers ranged from \$4 to \$4.50 with the bulk between \$4 and \$4.25.

Lambs made \$4 to \$7 with spring lambs at \$11 to \$13 per hundred-weight. Sheep brought \$3 to \$4.25 with the bulk between \$3.50 and \$4.

Whistling Well Continues Well On P. E. I. Farm

ALLSTON, P. E. I., June 7 — (CP) — James Beck has on his farm here a drilled well that "draws" and "blows" air as the tide falls and rises in Murray Harbor and Murray River about three miles away.

During the winter of 1917 Mr. Beck and his brother who was engaged at that time in drilling wells throughout the province, started one on his own premises. The drill was powered by a gasoline engine and had of steel. For about the first 12 feet a hole from three to four inches was made and a metal casing put down as the drill was operated through the earth.

From 12 feet downward the drill grew a three-inch hole through pure rock. Finally, after several weeks work, one evening when the drill reached about six inches, it suddenly dropped about six inches. The men had been working some time on the well and were expecting to reach water at any moment when the six-inch drop was noticed. It was decided water had been reached and they left the scene for supper.

When they returned the drill was raised but not a drop of water showed on the end. From the 30-foot level to the 160th there had been water seepage sufficient to keep the rock wet enough for drilling. When drilling was continued from the 160-foot mark through the hard rock it was necessary to pour water down the side of the pipe every few minutes to enable the drill to go through the dry rock.

Eventually the 200-foot level was reached and another drop occurred. The drill was raised and signs of water were noticed indicating drilling work was completed.

After a pipe-line was lowered and a pump installed at the surface a hissing sound was frequently noticed coming from beneath the pump where it sat on the base, fastened with set-screws.

Examination disclosed air was escaping on some occasions, while on others it was being taken in. At times the force was strong enough either way to put out a match.

For several years it remained a mystery as to what caused the "peculiarity." Then one day someone noticed the air was escaping at the time the tide was rising in the harbor and river three miles away. When the tide began to fall the action was reversed — air being drawn in. The hissing sound, somewhat like a peanut vendor's whistle but lower in pitch, has been heard every day for the past 20 years and will probably be as long as the well is in operation.

During a storm which causes a higher tide in the harbor and river the noise is much more noticeable. At times it can be easily heard outside of the pump-house with the door closed.

It is believed the six-inch drop which occurred at the 160-foot level in some way is connected with the harbor or river. As the tide is rising and water seeps through the rock air is forced out and escapes through the well. The action is reversed. It is believed, when the tide falls and water dropping creates a vacuum in the rock-crevices which draws air back.
