LONDON, Dec. 9.—Rt. Hon. Sir Alfred Mond, M. P., who recently returned from a visit to Canada, was impressed with the matter of electric power. In an interview here he contrasted the difference between Canada and England in this respect. He said: "The use of electricity in Canada for domestic purposes is an example to England."

"I was told in Toronto that on Monday, 'Washing day,' there is a difference of 10,000 horsepower between that day and the other days of the week on the load the wires carry."
