Pres. S. Storrs of the Connecticut Street Railway Company is the host and owner of the "Huguenot" which is conveying the party. There the guests will stop at the Hotel Taft, leaving tomorrow morning at 8.35, arriving in New York after an eight-hour run at 4.35 tomorrow afternoon. 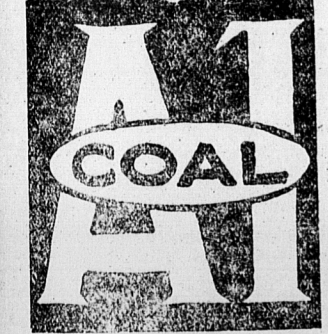

ICE REPORT. HALIFAX, March 27—Anticosti, West Point, South Point, Mulgrave—No ice. Heather Point, Money Point, Cape Day, Plat Point—Heavy close packed ice distant. The C. G. S. Earl Grey reported the Strait full of heavy loose ice with southwest wind, yesterday; ice on Nova Scotia shore with breeze northwest and clear today. A report received Monday was to the effect that many of the sealing steamers were stuck in the ice but that the Government steamer Stambley was clear and off Ingonish.
