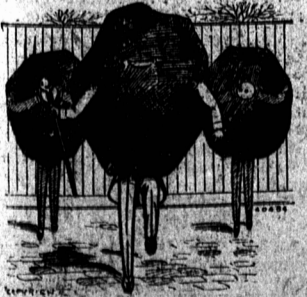

### AROUND THE FOX EXCHANGES

One good reason why expectations are general that the increase in foxes on the Island ranches this season will be well above the average, is the fact that the prevailing weather is reported to be highly suitable to the breeding of foxes; the losses that occurred last year in young being put down principally to the unusually hot spell of weather that was experienced during last April.

In addition to the suitability of the weather, there is this other consideration to be taken note of: There is now more general and greater experience among ranchers in the treatment and care of the animals than was the case last year.

Reports continue to be received of the arrival of litters at the ranches. The Seal River Company report one while Mr. J. C. McKendrick reports two or three litters of pups.

The stock of the R. J. McNeill Black and Silver Fox Co., Ltd., of Tyne Valley, has all been sold out. Mr. William Kinman, Secretary-Treasurer of the Freehold Silver Black Fox Company, was in the city on a visit yesterday, and returned home in the afternoon. Mr. Kinman reports excellent prospects for an increase of pups in his company's ranch. He says they have three litters already and have expectations of two more.

On Sunday evening a litter was born on the ranch of the Dominion Fox Raising Company, at Murray Harbour.

A large number of litters are reported to be doing nicely, and in some cases foxes have been seen outside the kennels, indicating the presence of the pups.

While litters are being reported on every hand, the percentage of losses is a point to note, is small. Up to the present the loss of one litter is reported in Queen's county, one litter in King's and four litters in Prince, the latter in ranches in the locality of Alberton.

J. F. Mendelsohn leaves next Saturday on the Empress of Britain for Europe, in the interests of the Fur Farmers' Bureau and Exchange, Ltd., Charlottetown. He may be followed at a later date by one of the directors of that organization.

Mr. D. J. Bonnell returned to the city yesterday from Halifax, after attending a convention of superintendents and salesmen of the Fur Farmers' Bureau and Exchange, Ltd. The convention was held in the Board of Trade Rooms of that city and was a pronounced success. Mr. Frank F. Tuplin, Summerside, addressed the conference on the past, present and future of the fur industry, and his address was followed with the keenest interest. Delegates were present from Europe, United States, Upper Canada and the Maritime Provinces.

### \$1,000 TO HELP ULSTERMEN

MONTREAL, April 14.—The Orange Lodges of Montreal decided to send \$1,000 to Sir Edward Carson in Ulster and to treble the sum if necessary. The meeting at which the money was granted agreed upon it. It was also resolved, while it was hoped that an amicable solution of the problem would be reached that Montreal Orangemen should not be backward in supplying their quota of men and money to help the protestants in their fight to remain subjects of the King and in the Empire.

### PREMIER FLEMING GRANTED LEAVE

ST. JOHN, April 14.—Hon. J. K. Fleming, Premier of New Brunswick has been granted leave of absence by the Government pending the investigation of the charges against him. Gen. J. Clarke, Attorney General is acting Premier, and Hon. J. A. Murray, Chief Commissioner of Agriculture, takes over Premier's portfolio of minister of lands, and mines. This was officially announced today.

LONDON, April 14.—London papers commenting on the decision of President Wilson to send a U. S. Battleship Squadron to Mexican waters, expresses the opinion that the United States are on the verge of armed intervention in Mexico with all its incalculable consequences. Both the Post and Daily Mail take the ground that intervention now can hardly be averted.

### SYDNEY MURDERER ALLOWED APPEAL TO FULL BENCH

(Sydney, N. S., April 14.—) Frank Haynes, convicted of the murder of E. S. Atkinson, and sentenced to be hanged on May 8, has had his application for a crown case reserved granted by Justice Drysdale. A telegram to this effect was received by Crown Prosecutor D. A. Hearn, K.C., yesterday from Deputy Attorney-General Jenks, of Halifax.

The case has been granted on the grounds of a possible misdirection by his lordship in his address. Argument will be heard this week, when on the decision of the full bench will depend whether Haynes will be granted a new trial or not.

### PRELIMINARY CIVIC ELECTIONS

(Canadian Press)  
ST. JOHN, April 15.—The preliminary elections for civic commissioners under the charter which provides for preliminary and final elections were held here today. There are three vacancies at the Council Board and the six men chosen as candidates for the final elections are Commissioners R. W. Wigmore, M. E. Agar, Messrs. G. F. Fisher, F. L. Potts, J. V. Russell and C. Deforest. The feature of the day was the showing by Commissioner Wigmore who ran second ahead. There were thirteen candidates in the field. Two weeks from today the six named will run again for the three seats and the majority election will be held.

### A FATAL FIRE

BOSTON, April 14.—In a fire which swept an apartment house in the Allston district early today seven lives were lost. The dead are Mr. and Mrs. J. Raymond Power and their baby, Mrs. Alice Shackford, Mrs. Edith G. Bemis, an unidentified girl and an unidentified woman. Many of the 125 people living in the 40 room house had thrilling escapes.

### INDIA'S NEW VICTORY

DUBLIN, April 14.—Prince Arthur of Connaught is said to be likely to be the first viceroy in Ireland under Home Rule. No member of the British Royal family has been at the head of the Government in Ireland since the Duke of York, afterwards Henry VIII, was appointed Lord Deputy Lord Lieutenant in 1794.
