# NEWS OF THE HORSES FROM ALL SOURCES

**THE NEW TRACK** at Vernon River Bridge on the property of J. J. McGilvray has been completed and is highly spoken of. The initial race meeting will be held on this track on the 10th of July, when a purse of \$100 will be put up and divided thus: \$30 for the free-for-all, \$30 for the 3-minute, and \$20 for a green race.

**THE ENTRIES** for the June meeting on the Speedway at Moncton, N. B. closed on the twelfth day of June. The company hangs out a program of \$1,800 for this meeting, divided as follows: 2.18 trot and pace, \$300; 2.35 trot and pace, \$300; 2.27 trot and pace, \$300; 2.21 trot and pace, \$300; free-for-all trot and pace, \$300; 2.20 trot, \$300.

**WM. MUTOH**, Village Green, has sold his handsome horse, Parkstone, by Parkside to Fred Cameron, Charlottetown. Parkstone is considered one of the best green trotters in the lower provinces as he has been a half miler in 1.10 and a quarter in 32 seconds. He is a horse of good size, weighing close to 1200. Mr. Cameron will get him ready to race in the state-races for trotters to be held at Charlottetown and Halifax.

**LEXINGTON, KY.** June 14.—Circus, the greatest thoroughbred brood mare in the United States, and which made a poor country doctor, J. D. Neel, a capitalist by her produce, is dead at the farm of Hon. Perry Belmont in this county. The mare had been sent to be bred to E. H. H. and fell dead of heart disease. She was twenty-one years old and her produce has carried Dr. Neel \$150,000. The late W. C. W. J. tried to buy her, but Dr. Neel would sell only her breeding qualities.

**H. H. HORNE**, has purchased from D. H. Martin, a bay gelding, with black points, 4 years old, standing 16 hands high, and weighing 1075 lbs. This horse is sired by Brazilian, and the dam is by Parkside, grand dam Precursor, great G. D. Allright great grand dam old Royal Harry. He has the breeding on that dam's side of four crosses of blood that has made the driving horse of the island famous for durability and speed. The public ought to hear a good account from this horse if breeding counts for anything.

**THE OLD FAMILIAR** form of Golden has been noted on the streets recently. Golden was brought to the island by the late Newton Large of Charlottetown and raced in the Charlottetown Driving Park the first time it was opened. He had a lot of turf work and lowered his track record to 2:19, after which he was retired. A few years ago he was sent to the farm to rest after his labours. Last winter he was brought back to his former stables and it can safely be said that he was never in better condition nor looked so well in his life.

**ST. ASA ROCKFORD**, Moncton, received a telegram a few days ago stating that his horse General, No. 2144, had won the \$1000.00 stakes at Dorchester "Purity" Club races in Dorchester (Mass.) Monday, and thereby had won a silver trophy. Mr. Rockford was in Dorchester a few days ago, and the speedy one was left in care of Wm. Nevis, who drove him to victory. The horse was shipped from Boston for St. John yesterday. Mr. Rockford has four speedy ones in his stable now, and will have one of the four in the races at Moncton.

**PARIS, June 14.**—The grand prix de Paris, for a purse of \$40,000 and sweepstakes, for 3-year-old colts and fillies, at one mile and seven furlongs, was won today by Maj. Eustace Lodge, English bred bay colt Spearpoint, by Carbine-Maid of the Mint. Spearpoint won by half a length. Thirteen horses started. The greatest interest was taken in the meeting of Spearpoint, which, ridden by Danny Mahar, the United States jockey, won the English derby at Epsom May 20, and William K. Vanderbilt's chestnut colt, Maintenance, the winner of the French derby. Spearpoint ruled favorite in the betting; he was easily accounted for. Maintenance, which ran unopposed, it was said after the race that the hardness of the track affected Maintenance.

Jean Soubert's bay colt Disceour, by Brio-Christiane, was second and R. de Monbel's bay colt Storm, by Bruak-Stormy Petrel third.


