Horne Predicts Baldwin's Return

WINNIPEG, April 4.—The Baldwin government will be returned to power in the next elections and the Liberal party will do better than it did last time, declared Sir Robert Horne, ex-Chancellor of the Exchequer in the British Parliament, who spent two hours in this city today while en route east in the course of a tour of the Empire. Sir Robert considered Premier Baldwin safe in being returned to power and the Liberal party, he thought would be solid under Lloyd George. The latter, he said, was the only leader available.

What he would like to see, Sir Robert said in discussing immigration was a greatly increased flow of immigration from Great Britain to the Dominions.

Throughout the Empire, he said, there were signs of coming prosperity. This was especially noticeable in Canada which was favored among the nations with her great sources of waterpowers. Britain herself, he thought, was beginning to turn the corner, and everything pointed to progress in the Mother Country.

His Majesty King George V. seemed to be one of the happiest persons attending the recent wedding of Lady Kathleen Crichton and the Marquis of Hamilton at St. Martin's in the Field Church, London, England. The affair was one of the smartest held for some time and when the photographer snapped him, the king seemed quite pleased with the way everything had gone.

France has appointed a new governor to rule her tiny domain in the North Atlantic, St. Pierre et Miquelon, the last vestige of the mother country's vast former power in the new hemisphere. His excellency visited Halifax on February 23, en route to the dot-like province. M. Francois Juvanon and Mme. Juvanon (1) have assured Canada that friendship under the two flags will be promoted. Three women nannies (2) of the islands are shown drying capelin at Ile aux Chien, for export to France. Towns people on the dock (3) are shown waiting the arrival of the mail steamer.
