

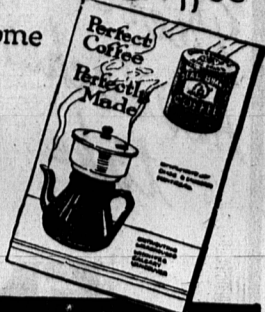

TO VISIT SAUNOR, SON.—Mr. John Williams, Prince Street, left on Tuesday for New York to visit her son Hudson, who arrived there on a British transport. It is nineteen years ago since he left his home here. He has been in the naval transport service since the war began, and has served on four ships which have been torpedoed. His life has been one of thrilling incidents. Some years ago it will be remembered that he fell from the opmast of a ship and was saved from a terrible death by grasping a part of the rigging and sliding in this way to the deck, his hands being burned to the bone in doing so. On another occasion he fell from the top of a 25 footerrick and sustained a broken leg and other injuries. One of the closest calls he ever had was during a storm at sea when a huge wave washed him overboard and a receding wave carried him aboard again.

WEDDING BELLS.—On Tuesday Sept. 17th St. Joseph's Church was the scene of an interesting event when Miss Agnes McKenna daughter of Charles McKenna, Kelly's Cross, was united in the holy bonds of matrimony to Mr. Herbert Mulligan, Kinkora, the ceremony being performed by Rev. Dr. Curran P. P. The bride was attended by Miss Katie Trainor, teacher of Victoria High School, while the groom was supported by Mr. William Smith Principal of Kinkora School. The groom's gift to the bride was a gold pendant and chain with pearl settings to the brides-maid, a gold brooch with an amethyst setting. Following the ceremony the bridal party drove to Charlottetown and dined at the Revere Hotel returning in the evening to the home of the bride where a reception was held, only the immediate relatives being present. The evening was pleasantly spent in music and songs after which the guests departed wishing Mr. and Mrs. Mulligan many years of happy wedded life.

RE-OPENING OF MALPEQUE CHURCH.
The beautiful weather of the 22nd, usually so characteristic of September mornings, proved very favourable for the re-opening of Princetown church, and although there was a heavy shower of rain in the evening the spacious church was filled to the utmost capacity. The interior had been thoroughly renovated for the occasion and it was very apparent that the pipe organ which had been duly installed by the efficient organ builder Mr. Arthur Morrissette of Moncton and the railing and chairs which were included in the purchase lately made by the congregation forms a valuable acquisition to the church. These together with the re-arrangement of the old and historic pulpit and some of the seats—the latter being necessitated by the enlargement of the platform—adds very materially to the general appearance of the church. The whole is a veritable transformation and the carpentry reflects much credit on the workmanship of Mr. Lee Owen of Hamilton.
The value of the organ was emphasized when in response to the touch of the talented and efficient organist, Mrs. James A. Campbell of Burlington, the strains of the beautiful prelude, "The Lost Chord" floated through the church. As the service advanced the real test of the work accomplished was given in the rendering of the different selections by the choir which, although always creditable, evidenced unmistakable signs of the improvement wrought. Considering the time at their disposal for practice the progress was marked and is one of the highest tributes that can be accorded the organist. Mrs. Campbell who has presided most acceptably at all the services since opening day.
After prayer and the singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers," the large congregation reverently joined in the dedication service so beautifully expressed by the pastor Rev. J. M. Murchison as he set apart the organ to the glory of God and to the memory of Dr. and Mrs. Wm. Kier, No words of eulogy were needed as we

NOTICE—MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917 REGISTRATION OF UNITED STATES CITIZENS

Male citizens of the United States living in Canada of AGES 21-30, both inclusive, MUST REGISTER BY REGISTERED POST with the Registrar under the Military Service Act of the district in which they live, during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING SEPTEMBER 28th, 1918; and such CITIZENS OF THE AGES 19, 20 AND 31-44, both inclusive, must so register during the TEN DAYS NEXT FOLLOWING OCTOBER 12th, 1918. It must be emphasized that THIS INCLUDES AMERICANS LIVING IN CANADA OF THE ABOVE AGES, MARRIED AND SINGLE, and includes ALSO ALL THOSE WHO HAVE SECURED DIPLOMATIC EXEMPTION OR HAVE REGISTERED WITH AN AMERICAN CONSUL, OR HAVE REGISTERED FOR MILITARY SERVICE IN THE UNITED STATES.

Registration letters may be handed to local Postmasters for despatch to the proper Registrar, under the Military Service Act.

MILITARY SERVICE BRANCH.

NOTICE—MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917 MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS

Having in view the importance of leaving a sufficient number of men on those farms, which are actually contributing to the National Food Supply, notice is hereby given as follows:

1. ALL MEMBERS OF CLASS I POSSESSING EXEMPTION AS FARMERS which is expiring and WHO WISH TO REMAIN EXEMPT should communicate with the Registrars under the M.S.A., of their respective districts, REQUESTING AN EXTENSION IN TIME OF SUCH EXEMPTION. Questionnaires will thereupon be issued to these men by the Registrar and they will receive further exemption upon furnishing satisfactory proof that they are contributing sufficiently to the National Food Supply.

2. In order to facilitate productive employment during the Winter months, MEN EXEMPTED AS FARMERS SHOULD APPLY TO THE REGISTRARS FOR PERMITS TO ENGAGE FOR THE WINTER IN SOME OCCUPATION OF NATIONAL INTEREST, SUCH AS LUMBERING, MUNITION WORK, ETC. Such permits will serve to enable exempted farmers to pursue other useful occupations for the months during which farming operations cannot be carried on.
