Protective Measures Against Mosquitoes

Those who spend time outdoors, either for recreation or otherwise are likely to be subjected from time to time to attacks by mosquitoes and blackflies especially during spring and early summer. Other biting flies such as the stable fly, the house fly, the deer fly and the tiny sand-gnat whose bites are "tiny red-dots of pain" are troublesome pests in certain areas, but are not so widespread, numerous and annoying as mosquitoes and blackflies. Any measures that can be taken to secure protection from these blood-thirsty insects will result in more comfort and efficiency in work and increased enjoyment of outdoor recreation.

BLOOD LINES COUNT

The breeding of poultry is the same as the breeding of other animals. Good, profitable, as well as undesirable traits are inherited from ancestors. Thus pullets hatched from ancestors of high laying ability will tend to be high, persistent layers, whereas pullets hatched from poor laying ancestors will in all probability turn out to be poor layers. The same applies to cockerels heading flocks. Cockerets from 200 eggs per year or better dams will transmit high laying ability to their offspring, whereas, if one uses just some common rooster that happens to be from some low producing ancestors, low producing pullets will quite generally be produced from his blood line.

MR. WALTER D. ROSS

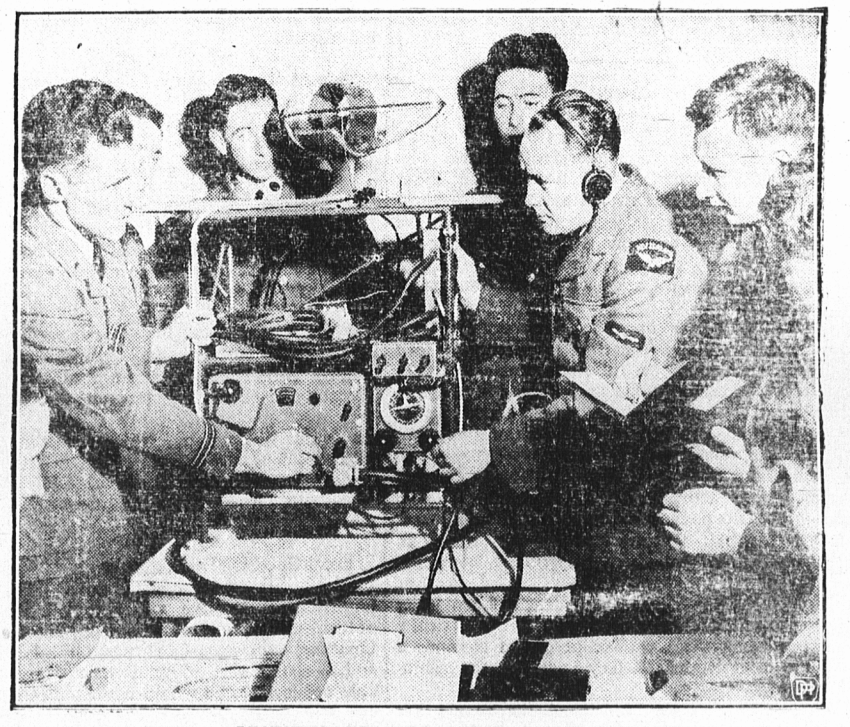
There passed away at Kinross P. E. I. on April 11th, 1941 Walter D. Ross son of the late Donald Ross of Kinross and Isabella MacDonald, Ross of Flat River, P. E. I. He was one of a large family of sons and daughters and was 65 years of age. He had always been in good health until a few days before he passed away and his death came as a great shock to his family as well as to the whole community. He was survived by his widow Matilda (McQueen) Ross, a son Douglas Ross, chartered accountant now in Ontario, and daughter Marion B. A. residing in Boston Mass. Also surviving are two sisters, (Christy) Mrs. James D. McLeod, Victoria Cross, P. E. I. and (Isabella) Mrs. Anselv Goodwin, Pugwash, N. S., who deeply grieve his passing. Others of the family who have passed beyond was a brother Lieutenant Ross who served in the Royal Artillery England and died while stationed in Malta, and is buried there. The late Dr. A. Ross of Charlottetown and later of Vancouver when he died was also a brother, and Lauchlin, also (Catherine) Mrs. Weatherly passed away two years ago and is buried in California. The deceased took a great interest in the old homestead and was the fourth generation to inherit the farm, which is a monument to his industry and good management. He took a keen interest in the public welfare and many a happy evening was spent at the homes and the "Cable Caley" as he read, quite fluently. His church and its services, was his delight. His funeral was largely attended even though the roads were nearly impassable. A short time ago he took over the Radio in the capacity of Secretary of Agricultural Institutes.
